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

Our five ABF licenced gold point events raised over \$18,000 in 2024. \$12,000 has been allocated to Youth bridge support.

We have provided travel support to three eligible youth players for Youth Week in Canberra in January 2025. The remaining funds will be used to support Youth bridge during 2025.

## **Identifying Opener's Points**


Depending on your system, Opener's points can be assessed, if not on the first bid, but definitely by their rebid (second bid). Take this example:

Board: 15 Dealer: South			
South	West	North	East
1C*	PASS	1S**	PASS
4S	PASS	PASS	PASS

<sup>\*1</sup>C=12-21HCP, 2+C

The sad story regarding this board, no-one bid 6S. Some players made 5, some made 6, whilst others made 7.


The two hands were:



Playing Standard, I did not identify partner's massive holding. Guilty as charged. Much later, way after teatime, I had woken up and then we got this beauty: (we were now switched to East/West)

Board: 33 Dealer: North

PASS	1H	PASS	1NT

The hands were:



Lead: 8C

I have 2 entries to Dummy, so I had to plan carefully. Club small from Dummy and the Ace appeared on my right. South returned the Club. One trick up the sleeve, with more clubs if they break nicely. I changed to a spade. King on my left, taken by Dummy's Ace. What now? I need a few tricks from the hearts, so I called for the HJ. South took the King and returned another club. I noted the suit break and I could take a breath. I took the club trick and played my S10. North took the SQ and exited with a small diamond. I could now clock up 10 tricks for a top.

The theme of this column is to understand partner's bidding and to assess their points. Partner showed 16-18 with her reverse. Added to my 9 and the fact that I held the minors well, we would have a chance at 3NT.

My mentor, Milton Miller always said: If you can play for 9 tricks in a minor, you had a chance to play 3NT for Game and 9 tricks.

Nigel Rosendorf's motto was: If you bid 5 of a minor, there's a possibility of a small slam.

There you go.

## Who's Who In WA Bridge!

A frequent player on the congress circuit is the humble and kind hearted Steve Rogoysky. Now I might be a tad biased but I think most players will agree that he is a true gentleman of our sport.



#### When did you start playing?

In 1984, I used to play competitive pool. From my second competitive pool season, one night of the week I went over to the parent's house of one of my teammates and we decided to try out new card games. We had a copy of Goren's card games and decided to start the games alphabetically and funny enough never really got past B. I then found Yahoo Bridge online and I was hooked.

#### Current home club?

Mandurah

#### What system do you use?

American Standard

#### What do you like most about bridge?

Each hand is a new puzzle. Yes, it becomes a challenge if partner and you don't visualise the same picture (sounds like a Wasgij). In theory you shouldn't see the same hand again, but I recall having an EA bridge computer game and it dealt me the same hand within a few months. No, I don't remember all of the hands, but it had dealt a board where the four payers had 13 cards of the same suit twice, thus I threw the game away after that.

## If you're not playing bridge what else do you like to do with your time?

I like to play Real-Time Strategy computer games, Xbox or Pixel Puzzles.

#### Most memorable bridge moment?

Watching the relief then joy on my partner's face when she made a 7Sxx contract. It narrowly beats

out the one time I played for WA and found out how challenging that level of bridge was.

#### Most faraway place you have played?

Geographically, Ocala Florida. I went over there to meet friends I played with on Yahoo bridge back in 2003.

#### **Favourite convention?**

Multi 2 Diamond as it adds many different hand combinations to our opening arsenal.

#### Most memorable hand that you have had?

Putting aside the EA bridge hand mentioned above, I did get a hand on BridgeBase Online containing 32 points. Interestingly, this came about 5 months after the dealing machine in Rockingham Bridge Club dealt a 33-point hand. Two rare examples of zero loser hands dealt last year.

#### Do you play online?

I play BridgeBase Online several times a week, most Sunday mornings Helen and I play against a brother and sister partnership who are based in the USA.

#### Advice to new players?

Bridge is a challenge. You will make mistakes. I view a mistake as a learning opportunity. The trick is to analyse and learn from it without dwelling on it. I teach bridge as well and I mention to the class that I made a huge mistake one time at Swan River Swiss pairs leading to a vulnerable -8 doubled result, but partner and I then went on to win 7 matches, draw 1 in the remaining 9 matches to finish 7th overall.

#### Anything else?

You may see me around in a new capacity of being a trainee congress level director.










## What Would You Do? - Solution

South for China passed and 4D became the contract. Liam Milne (W) lost two spades, a club

and a heart, one down, -50.

At the other table, Sartaj Hans (S) pulled off a psychological coup. He bid 4S, despite his minimum opening. That was due to go one off and might go two off. Hans was backing his view that, given the vulnerability, West could not stand the heat and would not pass 4S. Sure enough, West could not tell that South was overbidding and so he 'sacrificed' in 5D. Peter Gill (N) doubled, all pass.

West lost two spades, a club and mispicked the hearts for three down, –500. That was 10 Imps to Australia.




## Golden West 2024 Round 5

I enjoy competing in the Golden West Congress, an event run by BAWA since 1985. The first two vears saw Vera Vahala & Wendy Alsop triumph followed by John Ashworth & Tim Wright. There have been many multiple winners but Nigel Rosendorff heads the list with five wins, followed by Doreen Jones and Peter Reynolds with three each. While the event has been mostly played in Mandurah there have been venues all over town. However, for those who can recall the glory days when we played at the Atrium, and it was the culmination of our annual calendar. It was a gala event with the hotel filled with bridge players and we always played a session after dinner. On two occasions Henry Dyall and I came in for the night session resplendent in our dinner jackets! Now it is just a congress, which I still look forward to. despite the 90 km drive to Mandurah. In 2024 I had some expectations of a podium finish having snagged a top-level partner - a previous Golden West winner! All was going well as after four rounds we had accumulated 62 VPs, and a 15 VP average is what will certainly make you the winner.

In Round Five we came up against an excellent pair, and as the match progressed, we realised that it was not one that we were going to win. Our opponents bid the tight games, and their declarer play was faultless. Still, it was just a loss and not a disaster until the last board where a psyche destroyed us. I cannot only blame the psyche as I was a little cautious because I had 6 cards in my opponents suit with five of them total losers, so I decided to pass the opening 2D bid with my 17 points.



East was Chris Mulley, and after Simon Brayshaw, and my partner Tim Wright had passed, Chris opened with a bid of 2D which was explained as Flannery with four spades and 5 hearts showing 11 -15 points. With 17 points I would normally not hesitate to bid, but the coward in me took over the wheel. Simon's passed hand had improved tremendously, and he bid 2NT, asking for Chris to describe his hand. Chris bid 3H. and now Simon, jokingly suggested that he change his earlier bid to 2H. So we allowed them to play in 3H, which makes if declarer can pick the singleton queen of hearts in the North hand. We scored +100 and as the final nail in our 'bridge coffin' it was a big loss sending us crashing down to a lower table, and from there it is always a struggle to get back on top without considerable good fortune in the draw, or most of the good cards.

Put yourself in my seat. Would you double or bid 2NT? In discussion later my partner said that if I had bid 2NT it is almost certain that he would have raised the bid to 3NT and on the, very likely, heart lead 11 tricks are there on top.

How about the double? West is almost certainly going to bid 3H, and North has options. The double is best. It cannot be for penalty so should say "I have values, you make the choice of contract". Would Chris have bid 4H. Most unlikely. He had already succeeded in stopping our free flow of information, so I believe that he would have passed. What are my options? 3NT is a brave one and I may well have made the bid. The other bid is 4D. What will North do? The queen of hearts is a totally wasted high-card value, so North is likely to pass. On a non-spade lead 5D is cold.

I have just rechecked the traveller and realize that more than half the field missed the game, and I really believe that a cautious bidding style, after a likely 1NT opening will not win you many events in 2025. I will try and follow my own Z advice! Sue and Richard Grenside reached 4D, while Kath Negus and Jodie Bashan stopped in 2D.

So, if this is the first column that you are reading for 2025 I wish you a very Happy New Year, and bridge success at whatever level you choose to play in. Bridge is a wonderful game, and I cannot imagine what my life would have been without it. In fact, without bridge I would not have met Hans Rosendorff and got my first break, as a migrant, at the West Australian Newspaper in 1973.

In the days of my misspent youth, I would always 'declare' that I would never marry an only child or a non-bridge player. I did just that, and 65 years later do not have a moment of regret – except for my numerous bridge mistakes! So, all of you, enjoy your life and play the best bridge that you can. Winning is great feeling but playing good bridge should be your aim as then winning will automatically happen more regularly.

The Teams of Four Competition was again run in 2024.

Following the COVID period, numbers were significantly diminished, although I am pleased to report that the number of teams entered for 2024 was 25, compared to 23 teams in 2023

I know some of the smaller clubs think that their members are not interested in team matches, but for those players who wish to improve their rankings in the ABF Masterpoint scheme, along with Swiss Pairs, there is no easier way than team matches. For example, you need to be in the top 50% to get MPs in a pair's event, but you can come absolutely bottom in a team's event and still get your Red MPs. This is because each member of the winning team gets 0.56 Red MPs in the Open, and 0.42 Red MPs in the Novice and Intermediate Divisions for every win they achieve. So, for all you clubs that have never taken part in this competition, or used to, but don't now, consider giving your members a

chance to earn Red Points in 2025. And don't forget, apart from the cost of the Red Points, all monies collected go back to the clubs as prize money.

The number of Red Points allocated this year over all divisions were:

OPEN: 71.12

INTERMEDIATE: 43.26.

NOVICE: 68.46

A total of 180 players won 182.84 MPs in 2024.

## **Code Of Conduct**

It's now nearly a year since the Code came into operation and, during that time, not one case of poor or wrong behaviour has been referred up to the Behaviour and Ethics Committee, or the Demerit Scheme applied.

Personally, I am delighted. BAWA event and Congress Directors have confirmed with me that, in general, rudeness and other unwarranted behaviour has lessened in frequency and severity, and cases that have arisen have been dealt with by warnings or score adjustment at the time.

You may be surprised by this. You may well have witnessed breaches of the Code during this time. Indeed, a number of conflicts have been brought

to my attention informally and after the event. Because no action was taken at the time, i.e. the Director was not called, retrospective use of the Code was not considered appropriate.

So please, if you witness something that is clearly wrong or you are on the receiving end of unpleasantness, always call the Director immediately or at the end of the hand. If he or she is busy there should always be a Recorder in the room that can assist you.
