### **St John Training Session**

Recently, during a bridge session at our **Dunsborough venue (Naturaliste Community** Centre) one of our members collapsed. Fortunately, there was a happy outcome thanks to the rapid response from the centre staff. The incident highlighted that our bridge community is an aging population and such a scenario could happen again. One of our proactive committee members, Maggie West, contacted the local St John Sub Centre and discussed emergency response training for our members. St John's were more than happy to help and on Saturday morning, 8th June, six St John volunteer trainers gave us an insightful and comprehensive training session. From finding someone collapsed, how to check for breathing, how to send for help, how to assess, how to commence CPR and how to use an AED (Automatic Electrical Defibrillator). We were also given a free First Aid Pocket Guide and an information card about a free download for your phone, the "St John First Responder" app. This amazing app, when activated on your phone, lets the call centre know where you are, where your closest AED is located, and you will be talked through any emergency situation until help arrives. Why would anyone not have this app on their phone? Hopefully this report will encourage other bridge clubs to consider approaching their local St Johns Sub Centre and ask about training. Thank you St John Volunteers for giving up your Saturday morning and for this amazing training session.



Contract bridge is a partnership game and therefore you HAVE to trust your partner!


Take a look at the hand below..... Bd 11 Dealer S Nil Vul Bidding Sequence:

Deep Finesse says 6C, 7D, 7H, 2S or 7NT

The 4 hands were.....



East didn't recognise the amount of points in West's hand. Needed to evaluate his single spade was worth gold.

After the 3C from West, East could have asked for Aces and bid the Grand Slam in Hearts. A contract far easier than trying to circumnavigate 7NT, especially if you are less experienced.

Some sessions the cards can be awkwardly placed. The hand doesn't slot nicely into your system. At the end of this session, everyone complained that they were bottom.

Nice to be surprised with a 2nd.

So Di's Tip of the Day: Never Lose Heart. Play steadily and enjoy the great game of Bridge.

## Who's Who In WA Bridge!

Many of you will know this past editor as she is a regular congress and club player. I had the fortune of asking this lovely player a few questions. Thank you Beata Bieganski for answering them.

### First home club:

Undercroft Bridge Club -

Tad and I joined the club in 2003 and it is still our Home Club.

### What system do you use?

Before 2003 we played a lot of 'kitchen bridge' with friends with no formal system – with strong NT, all other bids natural and bottle of wine to assist. We never attended bridge lessons, but we managed to learn a proper system from books just before joining the club. First one was 'Polish Club' which we played for a long time (Tad still plays it with his partner!). I now play Standard American and am trying to persuade my partners to play 2 over 1 with transfer responses to a one club opening.

### What made you interested in learning bridge?

Bridge has always been very popular in Poland, especially before the 'computer age'. When I started university (still in Poland) in 1981 nearly all the students played the game. So, I 'had' to learn it just to be 'in-the-crowd' and later I grew to love it.

### What do you like most about bridge?

Social and mental stimulation - each game played will offer a unique set of problems and solutions. Every single deal is different; every deal poses a new problem and the challenge of finding the solution is a great source of enjoyment - even more so if you find the answer!

Bridge also provides us (me and Tad) with a very strong web of friends. We love going away to

major congresses and greatly value the social part of them – catching up with friends, along with some lively bridge discussion is a lot of fun!.

Someone said that bridge is 'the smartest game ever invented' and I think it's 100% true.

## If you're not playing bridge what else do you like to do with your time?

My other interests over the years have included reading, gardening, patchworking, quilting, craft and sewing.

### Most memorable bridge moment?

My most exiting experience in Bridge was being able to play some 'side events' and kibitz our teams during 2016 World Bridge Games in Wroclaw, Poland. It was the first world championship organized in Poland and players of 69 nations were representing their countries. Our own Renee Cooper and Jane Reynolds were in the Women's Team representing Australia.

### Most faraway place you've played?

Poland (naturally) – every time Tad and I visit Poland we always play a few games at the club.

### Memorable hand that you have had?

I have had a lot but I can't remember the distribution so the below one is recent.

EAST Dealer | NS Vulnerable


East opened the bidding 1NT (weak 11-14 points), South passed, West transferred to Hearts. I've passed as North holding



East bided 2H; South passed, West passed. Now back to me. If I double is my partner going to bid? We never discussed situation like this so I passed. (Happily, turns out to be a good decision.)

### **EDITING OF MATERIAL**

### Do you play online?

I'm using Bridge Base Online for bidding practice with my partners sometimes, however I do not play regularly online as I prefer to go out and meet people as often as possible.

### Best advice for new players?

Most importantly—Relax and enjoy the game.

- Don't discuss the hands or try to fix your system during the round.
- Focus on one board at a time and when that board is over, resist the natural tendency to think about what you could have done better.
- Don't rush look ahead and plan your play
- When there's time at the end of a round, consider starting a conversation with your opponents. (Most are happy to answer questions and will be flattered if you ask their advice.)
- Remember: bridge in not only about skill but also about communication

### Anything else?

As a partnership game it's very important to be a good partner – one of the hardest parts of bridge. If you can develop the discipline to not criticise your partner, you should regard it as an accomplishment. If you spoil the atmosphere at your table, it will certainly upset your partner and it could also affect your game. On the other hand, if you create a pleasant, clear-thinking space to play bridge, your partner will play much better.

My first experience with Bridge was in high school in 1973, when a student joined our year and wanted to show a few classmates "this game" he had been teaching himself. It lasted for six months and then he was gone. Ten years later, I started work at what was the Churchlands Campus of WACAE and discovered two tables playing in the staffroom at lunch times. I watched on for a while and then joined in. In 1984, I started playing at Greenwood Bridge Club (now closed) in the staffroom at Greenwood High School.

### What made you interested in learning bridge?

My mum had me playing various forms of card patience when I was really young. We were playing Canasta at home when I was in my teens. So, card games were already of interest when that school friend introduced me to the game. Also, my grandmother was a founding member of the South Perth Bridge Club, so I got plenty of encouragement from her.

### What is your favourite convention?

Myxomatosis Twos, in spite of all the negative opinions from those who would tell you they know better. With one bid, it allows you to express what could be a strong single-suited hand, or a weak single-suited hand, or a hand holding two specific 5-card suits, which could be either weak or strong, or a balanced hand with graduated HCPs count. Best feature is the formula is exactly the same for each 2-level suit opening, none of this 2C means one thing, 2D something else and 2H/S something totally different again, all of which could still be indeterminate after

### When did you start directing?

I started directing casually at the Wanneroo Bridge Club (now closed) in 1987, but that was just as an unqualified playing director. I started looking after some supervised sessions at South Perth and WABC and then did the course under the tutelage of Bill Kemp. I started directing formally in 2009.

### What drew you to directing?

I was made redundant from my IT job in 2009, and soon found that the payout wasn't going to last. Directing at clubs that pay looked like an opportunity to earn at least a little something until I could find a new job. It has grown from there into my now full-time job.

## **Most faraway place you have directed?** Canberra in the Summer Festival of Bridge in

2019 and then again in 2024.

## What is your most common reason to be called to the table?

Three infractions represent about 95% of all calls I get, pretty much in equal proportion - Lead out of Turn, Insufficient Bid and the Revoke.

### Do you have a favourite law?

Not really, although Law 36 Inadmissible Doubles and Redoubles are fun to adjudicate when a player has doubled their partner, or opened the bidding with a double.

### Do you miss playing in congresses?

The ones that I have to direct? Yes, to a degree. But I do try to play in as many as I can when they are run by other clubs, so I'm not that starved of opportunities.

### Most memorable moment directing?

Not really. Maybe having one of my rulings upheld by the Reviewer, after it was appealed in a congress. Or perhaps having to rework on the fly my pre-arranged movements for 45 tables to 49 tables to account for the 8 pairs who walked in, claiming they didn't know they had to enter (I have had to do similar in almost every WABC

Congress I have directed).

### What did/do you do for work?

As it happens, I am full time directing. Regular sessions at Melville, South Perth, Bayswater and WABC (4), with the occasional Gold Point and Red Point events at West Coast and Joondalup, as well as congress directing for WABC, Undercroft, Maylands and Bayswater. Plus a little bit of home computer support here and there, mainly for

other bridge players. It all keeps me very busy.

### Is there anything else you would like to share?

I am very interested in getting more involved in teaching, I have run a couple of courses and may well get the opportunity to run some more in the future. Of course, there are only so many hours in a week, so that may have to be at the expense of some of my directing sessions. After all, I do need to sleep!




## Albany Congress Open Sesame

The annual Congress at Albany is always something we look forward to for many reasons: we love Albany, our friends, Kate and Murray, live there and the food is terrific.

Here is an interesting hand from the Qualifying Pairs:



North opened 1C and East overcalled 2S. South passed, as did West.

Now what would you do as North? Make your mind up before reading on.

It was a lovely Congress, well attended and efficiently directed by Brian Wade, who keeps his calm at all times. Thank you, Brian. I must also thank the ladies who worked hard in the kitchen to provide beautiful food for us all. We enjoyed it so much that we have already booked our accommodation in Harbourside for next year!

Now, what have you decided to bid as North? Would it surprise you to learn that North has an easy choice? The recommended action is double. North is short in the opponent's suit and has support or tolerance for the unbid suits, the typical holding for a takeout double. North does not know South has strength in Spades, but the balancing double allows South to pass with length and strength in Spades or to take out the double to a suitable spot otherwise. Given the vulnerability, passing should appeal greatly to South.

On the lead of the ace of Diamonds, followed by a switch to the Club 8 should take 2S down two,

maybe even three off. Plus 500 or plus 800 would be a better score than 3NT making 400.








## 7H Doubled—Best bid a PASS

The best bid that you will ever have in your bridge dictionary is the PASS, and playing against Deana Wilson, in the State Seniors trials, her PASS, could possibly have changed the structure of the team. But I am getting ahead of myself.

Playing with Tim Wright, we had a little luck and found ourselves leading the field at the end of round 13. There were two rounds to go, round 14 against Deana Wilson and Sue Gammon, with the last round against the best pair, Val Biltoft, and Trevor Fuller. It was the last board of a reasonably flat match and I, sitting north, picked up this horror and was pleased to see my partner place a bid of 1H on the table.



Sit yourself in the west seat, and I believe that there will be very few of you who will pass on this hand, but Deana Wilson did. What is your choice? A double, or even 1NT, with three little hearts in your hand?! Deana's reasoning was that if north/south proceeded with the bidding that they would be in for a big, and unpleasant surprise.

Now get into my seat. What would you bid? My thoughts were that we had a 10-card fit, and my hand was worthless in defence. In my book 4H is the only bid to make. It places huge pressure on east, and, if south held a stronger hand any bid by east could end badly for east/west.

Sitting east was Sue Gammon, who has never been a 'shrinking violet' when it comes to bidding. Without a moments hesitation Sue bid 5C. My partner did not hesitate for a moment and bid 5H with a great deal of alacrity. Deana did not hesitate either and bid 6C. She did tell me later, that if partner could bid 5C, when vulnerable, missing the KQJ in clubs, that she must have a good hand and probably be void in hearts, and would have bid 6C, even without the 5H bid. All sound reasonable bids which were quite justified. The ball is now in my court, and as these three bids took about 10 seconds to make, I did not wish to look like a coward. Partner had to be short in clubs, so I boldly bid 6H. Sue felt that she had said enough and passed, as did Tim. We then saw that Deana had placed the 7C bid on the table, and I rued the day that I had decided to raise the ante with such poor values.

The bidding came back to Tim, and I felt that he would double and we would collect a few hundred points in our favour. That did not happen. The world had stopped revolving leaving us in our own little "Time Bubble". Then, quite meticulously, Tim placed the 7H bid on the table and our private world exploded with a red card winning the auction. There was nothing in the play. We lost the first five tricks for minus 1400, but I was not in the least bit concerned as we know that 7C was unbeatable, and there was little doubt that all, or most of the field, would bid 6C, for +1390, making our minus 1400 quite a reasonable result.

It was not to be. Not a single other pair bid past 5C and all of them lost 1.71 imps while our opponent picked up 13. We had dropped to third and were playing against the best pair in the room. However, that last bidding sequence of ours had given us the courage to face number one. It was a very close game, and we took the honours by .7 of an imp. We come back to what I started to say, and that to pass with values is often the best decision to take, when there is no better bid to make. I believe that at all the other tables the bidding had gone 1H: X: 3 or 4H, 5C, which was passed out.


