IMPROVE YOUR BRIDGE WITH THE ABF'S DAILY COLUMN



President's Report

Compared with some other states bridge in WA has always enjoyed harmonious relationships between clubs and between clubs and BAWA. One of the reasons for this successful partnership is the careful management of events; particularly Red Point Events. The ABF has explicitly delegated the Sponsoring Organization responsibility to the states and the ABF Masterpoint Scheme is administered in WA by the State Masterpoint Secretary David Burn. The principal that has guided BAWA over the years is that if you have held your Congress on a particular weekend for a period of time then that weekend is yours until you no longer wish to continue. No other club can run a B4 Red event at the same; the red points will simply not be approved. This has been an effective policy which has caused few if any problems. There have been however, a couple of minor issues over the past 12 months primarily with clubs running B4c red point events. The regulations regarding these events are quite clear.

Grade B4c events which should ordinarily be conducted during the regular club sessions of play, and may only be advertised within the club. Clubs can also conduct up to two Grade B4c sessions at other times, provided that

- 1. These must be single session competitions, and must not be advertised outside the clubrooms.
- 2. These sessions are to come from the respective club's annual B4c session allocation.
- 3. To ensure that there are no clashes with nearby Congresses or ABF Championships, the prior approval of the respective State Masterpoint Secretary is required.

I confess here to being completely unaware of these regulations and have been severely chastised by David for advertising such events on the BAWA web site. In future I will clear all such advertising with David before posting.

If in doubt check with David at SMPS@bawa.asn.au

I have been really impressed with the way the ABF's new National Marketing Manager, Peter Cox, has hit the ground running and has put in place a number of schemes to help promote our game. One thing Peter has emphasised is that the future of the game rests almost entirely with the clubs and their ability to attract and, more importantly, retain new players. The ABF has allocated considerable funds to help clubs with this goal. I would urge clubs to investigate the scheme, find out what is required and apply. Details can be found on our web site.

For the first time I ventured down to Dunsborough to play in the annual ZONTA Bridge Charity Day. It was great fun; Jane Moulden and her team organised a fine event. Well done. The only downside was the drive home during which the majority of Saturday's 90mm of rain fell. Thank goodness for the thick white line on the edge of the highway.



REPORT from our Bridge Teacher Esther Saunders

Weekly Intermediate bridge lessons started at the Bunbury Bridge Club rooms on May 20th. There was a good turn out and we have consistently had between 5 and 6 tables of enthusiastic attendees. Lessons are open to all, not just Bunbury Bridge Club players. The schedule can be found on the club's website, under Lessons.

Taking on board feedback from last year, the program has been expanded from 8 weeks in 2018 to 24 weeks this year.

Each session now focuses on one concept and includes several hands of play to practice that concept. Once the hands are distributed and sorted, each player places their hand face up on the table and everyone at that table discusses how they think the bidding should go, and why. Once the bidding has been decided upon, the hands are played out and then discussed as a whole group before the next hand is distributed. As often happens in bridge, not all hands are straight forward and sometimes a player must decide between two or more options when making a bidding decision. The main lesson overall at every session is to respect your partners decision, understand the predicament they must have been in, and treat your partner with dignity.

It is, above all, a partnership game. My favourite saying is, 'The difference between an Expert and a World Class bridge player is the way they treat their partner!'

DEEP-AND-MEANINGFULS #9

Paul Brayshaw taps into the innermost thoughts of Deep Finesse®

Sitting in the function room of a Melbourne hotel, you flex your arms and rip another 13 cards out of the North slot. You have gained a lucky pass to play in the Victor Champion Cup this year, and you don't want to waste it. So far, your team has had a good tournament and you are in the running for a top-10 placing. You survey the cards in front of you:

♦KJT9 ♥void ♦AKJ953 **♣**Q76

Hmmmm - a nice little collection. After RHO passes, you get to open this with $1 \blacklozenge$. LHO makes a weak jump overcall with $2 \blacktriangledown$. You consider the merits of a reopening double with your void, however partner suddenly comes to the party with $3 \spadesuit$, natural and GF (that's 'game-forcing', not 'gluten-free'). Tasty, at any rate! With many options available, you decide upon $3 \spadesuit$, planning to follow up with \spadesuit support over 3NT. However, partner finds $5 \spadesuit$ instead. "Wooooah, somebody stop me!" you think, as partner obviously has values concentrated outside of hearts. One more for the road then $-6 \blacktriangledown$. The lead is the \blacktriangledown A and you buy this dummy:

With no club void lurking, the play is the opposite of challenging, just losing to the ◆Q which is protected offside. You are well-satisfied with your efforts until you eye off the DF matrix on the hand record during the post-mortem. What's this – NS can make 7♣??


Of course – there is the potential to rid oneself of the diamond loser if playing in clubs! DF says it is true, at any rate, and she is never wrong, as you are well aware. You count the top tricks in a club contract – five ♣, two ♦ and four ♠ due to the unbelievably lucky lie of the spade suit. Two more tricks required, then.

"You can ruff two hearts in North to make it," says one of your team mates, from which you glean that your conversation with yourself was not as silent as you thought.

"Mmm hmm," you mumble. "Oooooh, hang on a sec, I think your entries might be a bit screwed..."

A quick conversation later it is established that, on a heart lead, 7♣ is straightforward. Assuming South is declarer, ruff the heart, spade to hand, ruff a second heart, draw trumps and pitch the remaining losers on the spades. But there is the troublesome diamond opening lead. The ♠A is an entry back to hand to ruff a heart, but what is the second? A trump cannot be used, as then there is no way back to hand before West savagely ends vour dreams for the tournament. Defenders always take their trick in a grand slam in a certain manner, you recall. It is a unique mixture of speed, smugness and feigned humility. Then, they always extend the pleasurable experience by going into the tank, as if they're cleverly trying to find a way to take another trick. You don't dare to claim in case they can.

Back to the task at hand – and what about a trump lead? That tangles you up in an even worse way! Let's see. After two ♠ ruffs, you're here:



And... you're in dummy. If you try spades, East is going to ruff one of your vital tricks and you will be one shy.

No, there's got to be a line that you haven't thought of. There is no hope for a squeeze. Throw-ins in grands tend not to be successful. Where is that 13th trick coming from? What did Sir Arthur Conan Doyle once say through his most famous creation - Sherlock? "Once you have eliminated the impossible then whatever remains, however unlikely, must be the truth." Or something like that? Well, we can safely eliminate spades as the source of the extra trick, if we follow the rules of bridge. Hearts cannot provide the extra ruff we need, as we know, and they cannot be isolated as a menace against a single defender - eliminated. Clubs – see spades – eliminated. That only leaves diamonds. But Holmes, this is all nonsense! East takes the third round of those! And. and... ooooooh, who said that?


The words "there's an entry, my dear Watson, there's an entry..." were whispered into your ear. However, your team mates silently stare at you as if you're from an exoplanet, so it probably wasn't one of them. No-one else is around. You look sharply at the DF matrix – was it that seductress with her siren-like voice once again?

A quick glance north-westward of the DF grid and suddenly, your original impression of this hand falls away from under your feet. A few stark facts come into consideration together for the first time: Clubs are 3-2; the defender with the long clubs also has the long spades; the SQ falls; South has three top club honours; North has an entry in trumps. Yes, unbelievably, it would seem that diamonds are a source of tricks after all...

"I've got it, guys!" you exclaim. "On a diamond lead, you pitch the hearts on diamonds." Polite expressions of doubt, or similar, emerge from the lips of your team mates, who have already given up and moved on to another hand.

"I'm serious! Win the lead and get to the position where you've drawn two rounds of trumps with the ace and king and played one top diamond. Now you can play four rounds of spades to pitch two DIAMONDS, with East out of trumps."



"Ruff a diamond with the ♣J. All of a sudden, dummy's diamonds are good! And there's an entry..."

"And if you get a heart lead instead, you play the line of ruffing two hearts," one of your team mates continues, obligingly taking the words out of your mouth. "Very good. Can we look at Board 25 now?"

Humph, no-one will ever understand the thrill of these things, you think to yourself. This is why DF speaks to you and you only. You smile in reverie – perhaps, just perhaps, DF will come to life one day. And you will be her special friend.



For the last 3 months a large group of Australian women have had the benefit of online coaching from American professional and world champion Karen (Kate) McCallum. Kate is highly regarded as an author and teacher, and it's been great to have her living here in Aus for the last 4+ months. Many of us have had the opportunity to play against her in National competitions and she's been generous in sharing her knowledge and sound advice whenever asked.

Kate's teaching focus has been on the slam zone and Sue Lusk and I got the chance to put some of this into practice playing in the recent Autumn National Women's Pairs in Adelaide.

I've written up some of the slam hands below:


I was excited when Sue transferred to clubs and I could show support. I wasn't overly comfortable with my off shape 1NT opening and was much happier to play in a suit.

Sue bid 3H's this was either a fragment looking for NT or a cue bid for clubs. I next cued 4D's which denied a spade stopper and showed interest in playing game or above in Clubs. Partner was very happy when I denied a control in spades and placing my values in the other suits she confidently bid the slam.

We were the only pair in 6 Clubs. I think we had an easier auction being undisturbed. After I open 1NT it's not easy for East to show such a weak 6 card spade suit. If I'd opened 1D a fair bit of our space might have been taken up by the ops.

We were glad for the 10 imp pick up as we came out of the match with a draw.


As soon as I opened 1H I'm sure Sue was wondering which H slam we'd be in.

1H – 5D's directly would have set up an exclusion keycard auction, asking me to show keycards in H's outside of the D suit. With East interfering, bidding 2D, Sue's jump to 5D's was unaffected. Had East bid 3D's or 4D's we would still have been fine. However, if East decides to bid 5D's our bid is taken! I'm not sure if this happened anywhere, however I am surprised we picked up 8 imps for the grand. Perhaps not all the pairs had exclusion keycard in their system?

Once I showed 2 keycards, Sue had no problem bidding the grand, counting 5 trump winners, 5 or 6 spade winners from the side suit, the Ace of clubs and one or two diamond ruffs.

Round 3 | E/W | Contract 6C | Pick up 11 imps – When system gets in the way!

Sometimes having a useful system tool comes at the expense of something more useful in a particular auction! Sue and I play agreement of our minor at the 4 level (after a game force auction has been set up) as keycard in that minor. This gives an edge in bidding minor suit slams, the downside is you can lose the ability to cue bid. This is what happened here, the 4C bid agreed the trump suit and we were unable to set C's and cue bid to diagnose our lack of a spade control.

Sue had to take a view, and based on us only missing 1 keycard, and with the opponents unlikely to lead her suit, she bid the slam.

South has to find the aggressive lead of the KS to beat 6C's. It is often right to make an aggressive lead against a contract that has not involved cue bidding. However, placing that KS on the table at the opening lead might be what gives us the contract. This time we got lucky.

We bid 5 slams and picked up 54 imps on these boards. We missed two slams, each one costing us only 2 imps. Sometimes they are just too difficult to bid and the rest of the field finds it the same.

We did manage a win, but needed all of our slam imps to get there. After the competition I heard that this was Sue's 6th victory out of the 10 year's the event has been running, a fabulous hometown track record!

The heading of this article is taken from one of Kate's lessons and there is no better way to finish this article than quote from it.

"There are frequent double-digit gains when you get the slam zone right and double-digit losses when you get them wrong. Most of the time, in long KO matches, the slam hands swing the match. So, it's obvious that, in order to win against good teams, we have to get the slams right."



Is there any partnership that can honestly say that they have the perfect defence against weak twosuiter or weak single suiter bids? In this group are Benjamin Two's: Multi Two's: Tartan Two's and Optimals. There are others but they are not used here so let's stick with what we come up against.

We all have our methods as to how we handle these bids and most of them are fairly basic. However, defence methods cannot cover every type of hand, as there are different degrees of strength and shape. So what I always suggest to any regular partner is that we try and understand what our partner is thinking when making that particular bid, this because it is not only what they say, it is what they do not say that is just as important.

This deal was from the WABC Winter congress and only 25 percent in a good field bid the slam. Only one pair **Ross Blakey** and **Gill Blakey** bid to 7H against a very unlucky Sue Gammon/Deana Wilson. Obviously there was always the one 3NT bidder who lost the first six tricks!

DEALER EAST: NIL VUL



East will open the bidding with 2D:2H or 2S. The first two with options and the third showing a weak six card spade suit. Believe it or not, my partner and I would open 2C which is also a Multi bid in our system which includes the 4-4-4-1 shape.

You have your own defence but please indulge me as I ramble on.

East opened 2H, which showed a weak six card spade suit, or five hearts and another suit, My choice of bid would be 3H. This is where partnership agreement must be strong and trusting. There was no double, so what sort of hand should south have? Surely, a natural heart suit with at least six, as east could have had five hearts. Yes, unlikely but not impossible. So we are agreed that the suit has to be sound. West passes and you as north have to make a decision. Please do not start shouting at me, but I believe that, at least for the moment, that you have to forget about your beautiful, seven card diamond suit. What you need to know is what partner has for that over call of 3H. Is it just a nice six card heart suit, headed by the ace, king and knave or something better? That is all that matters as if it is the former your diamond suit is just a nice suit as you have good trump support for partner, to handle that spade void.

Let's keep it simple. You must know that east's suit must be a weak spade suit so will 3S be a cue raise by implication, though at the table could well be taken for something else. How about 4S? A great bid, but what is it showing? Is it four card trump support with a splinter or void? All guesses for the moment. Should west's silence be taken into consideration, or ignored? We could become very basic and bid 4NT - Key card Blackwood- and when we find that partner has the first option, a six card suit, headed by the ace and king, we just settle for 6H, which would have given you plenty of imps.

What would 4D have meant? It would, to me, show a good suit but lacking support for my hearts. I would now bid 4H still not being in a position to show anything extra. Should I bid 5D with two likely spade losers off the top? Possibly not.

At one table north bid 4NTand south responded with 5C - showing zero or three key cards. North bid 5H and south, inexplicably, passed. I asked south why this had happened and he admitted that it was wrong but that on the bidding and holding two spade losers he was uncertain on how the cards were placed. Still, a totally wrong decision as

he should have trusted partner and played the system bidding 6H.

This brings us back to north's first choice of bid and that was to find out what south held. I polled the hand and the view was that 3S had to be a strong bid. Now if south bid 3NT it would show the first type of hand with a spade stopper, which north does not want to know about. The moment south repeats the heart suit north can bid 5S. Now certainly this becomes EXCLUSION Blackwood – sometimes called Voidwood, which I love and have written about before. This is a very useful convention and all serious partnerships should have it in their armoury.

Some suggested that, on this hand, 4S should be used as Exclusion Blackwood. It seemed like a good idea at the time but on more careful reflection consider that the only bid that north should/could make was 3S. Once south repeated the heart suit Exclusion (5S) could be used, and when south shows three keycards, which excluded the ace of spades, north would bid 7D. Why 7D you ask? Seems a rational decision as 7H can be defeated if the hearts broke 4-1. 7D can handle this bad break, though entries will be a problem if south does not have the king of clubs. So is bidding the Grand Slam a poor choice?

North could ask for kings, but with a known nine card fit, headed by the ace, king and queen, most would settle for 7H, as 7D could well be a bottom in a strong field.

This is probably a deal that you could discuss with your favourite expert or with someone like Fiske Warren, Jonathan Free or Andy Hung and then tell me where I went wrong.



Game or Slam That is the Question



Game or Slam that is the question. In the recent G.N.O.T. qualifying rounds, there were many hands that gave rise to the question of Game or Minor Slam! Major slams seem easier to find, so why can't the Minor Slams be found.

Take this example Playing Acol, (Yes, she actually played Acol on the day!), West, Dealer, passed and I as North, with an 18 count opened with 1H, (Masters of the Acol craft might disagree, but that's the best I could do in that moment), Partner, David Clarke came back with 2D and I followed up with 2S, hoping I was showing a strong hand. When David then replied with 3D, I knew he didn't like my majors, nor could he bid No Trumps, so the next bid was 6D - the final contract.

Deep Finesse says 7 D, 7S, (in a 4-3 fit) or 7NT can be made. We were happy with our contract, making all thirteen tricks. The opposing N/S pair decided that 3NT was the best that could be found.

The four hands were:-



Sometimes you have to be like Sherlock Holmes to detect the shape and length of partner's hand, by the bidding or the lack of high cards in the shorter suits, hence not being able to bid No Trumps.



Test Your Slam Play


SOLUTION



You made your contract, right? But for a top match point score, did you get the overtrick that was on offer?

The books will tell you that to combine your chances in hearts and clubs, you should start by leading a low heart towards the queen: if that loses to East's king, you can try the club finesse next. Whereas if you start with the club finesse and it fails, you cannot afford to play a heart towards the queen later.

Put not your faith in books! The correct play is to start with the club finesse. Whether it wins or loses, take all your remaining club winners, and the ♥A, then run the diamonds to reach this position:



When the last diamond is played (you discarding your \checkmark 7), West is squeezed.

So, the contract is cold when either of the Q or V K are onside, and with an overtrick if they are both onside, as long as you finesse in clubs early.


The moral: Matchpoints is a marvellous game (my favourite, in fact). It produces opportunities that boring old IMP play can only dream of.

Leading up to it

SOLUTION

From a Butler Trials:



West led the H4 against South's 3NT: jack – queen – five. Dummy won the heart return and declarer erred by continuing with the SK. West took the SA and played a third heart. South won but even though South collected four club tricks, he was one trick short. That was –50 and –10 Imps. Datum: N-S 420.

After the HK at trick 2, South should come to the CA and lead a spade towards dummy. If West takes the SA, South has three spade tricks and just needs to manage the clubs for four tricks. If West ducks, dummy wins the spade and South now plays DK. This makes nine tricks if diamonds are 3-3 or declarer can collect four club tricks.

A better option is to come to hand and lead a diamond to the king. If West takes the ace, you have three diamond tricks. If West ducks, the DK wins and now you can play the spades. You make two spades, two hearts, a diamond and hopefully four clubs. If the DK loses to the ace, then you must hope for diamonds 3-3 and four tricks from the clubs. If you play a spade first and the SK loses to the SA, there is no prospect of a favourable break in spades for an extra trick.
