President's Report

Congratulations to Jane Reynolds and her team for the recent and successful Western Senior Pairs. A minor computer glitch did result in the wrong minor placegetters being announced incorrectly. This was no fault of Jane's and fortunately the correct second place getters Diana Quantrill and Audrey Stokes were informed of the error before they left for home. Not so fortunate for the incorrectly announced second place getters – they had already spent the \$600 for second place.

Whilst overall table numbers are healthy Thursday evening state events continue to struggle to attract the numbers necessary for BAWA to run them. It is not sustainable for BAWA to run these events at a loss. Costs include rent, directors' fees and board and hand record production. The treasurer has identified 10 tables as the break-even point for events. Consequently, events with less than 10 tables will be cancelled. Naturally this decision needs to be made a few days prior to the advertised start date. If you wish to play state level bridge then you will need to

enter events and enter them within a reasonable time.

After some years of representation from a number of players BAWA introduced a couple of daytime events. As I type this the Daytime Open Teams beginning June 6 has four teams entered. I think it is most unlikely six teams will enter in the next week; I would love to be proved wrong. On the positive side it is pleasing to see the Daytime Open Pairs, beginning August 15, with 24 pairs entered. I find it a bit weird that players prefer pairs to teams but hey – that's just me.

Very pleased to see the Geraldton Congress entries looking quite healthy. Nevertheless, should you feel like getting away from this winter weather for a weekend Geraldton structure their congress to finish with a Bar-B-Que lunch on Sunday. This leaves plenty of time to head home for work on Monday.

Clear and Present Danger

From Di Brooks

Part of a good defence is to have a strong understanding within your partnership, especially as you defend twice as often as you play as Declarer.

Discards, Count and Attitude are all part of the importance of getting it right!

When you partner someone for a One-Off session, it's best to keep it simple.

K.I.S.S. (Keep It Simple, Sweetie). Let's look at the choices; -

Which card to play for discards?

Agree to throw from a suit that you hold interest in or not wanting that suit.

Your choice!

Attitude: High card to encourage or low? - Again, your choice.

Count: High-Low for even, Low-High for Odd number of cards held in that suit.

So you have all these choices from the above selection and you choose to have Hi-Lo for one part and Lo-Hi for another, you will definitely get confused. The K.I.S.S. Method - to keep it simple. Make sure you use the same strategy throughout the game. Therefore, your signals will be Clear and you will not Present yourself into Danger.



No bidding from us on the E/W side of the fence. Peter opened 1S, South showed his 5-card diamond suit and his 10+ points. Peter became the Declarer in a dynamic contract of 2S. I needed to find a reasonable lead, holding: -

S:65 H:Q108753 D:6 C:A1042

Not a terrifically exciting hand from our point of view. The lead of the Club Ace wasn't considered, neither was a small heart, so the end decision was the diamond singleton. This was taken by partner, returning a high diamond. Won by me and I played a small heart. This is where the Greeks came into the equation. Dummy won with the HA and Declarer then cashed the HK. Partner ruffed the second heart and then the defence came into their own. West, Florence played a small club, taken by my Ace and back came another heart.

The result - down two and 100+ to us. A minor victory- we won't dwell on our -29 loss. It's the small things in life that give us so much pleasure.



Rockingham Bridge Club Committee set up a working group of three to prepare a program for promoting the club and the new courses for beginners in readiness for June start.







Test Your Slam Play



SOLUTION



On the reasonable assumption that West has the \bigstar K, \blacktriangledown Aand \bigstar KQ for his opening bid (the only HCP outstanding), you have a claimer. But you have to do it right.

Win the ◆A and sadistically lead out 7 rounds of clubs to reach this position:



You need only have watched that none of the $\bigstar K$, $\blacktriangledown A$ or $\bigstar Q$ have appeared.

Lead a heart, West must duck. Trump a diamond. If the \bullet Q has now dropped, then lead another heart, forcing West to either concede to dummy or play a spade into your tenace.

If the \bullet Q is still outstanding, West has it, along with the \blacktriangledown A. There's only another one card in his hand, the \blacktriangle K. Drop it.


One trap to avoid on this deal is to play a heart early, before you have drawn trumps. Then West can skewer you by playing ♥A and another heart.

The moral: Can't think of one. Maybe 'draw trumps'? Often a good idea.

Higher Grade

By Ron Klinger

When should you open with a 3-level pre-empt and when should you opt for a weak two / multi-2D. With a 7-card suit it is almost always best to start with a pre-empt if you are within three tricks of your bid. With a 6-card suit, choose the weak two / 2D option, but at favourable vulnerability, a 3-opening is acceptable with a 6-card suit, again as long as you are within three tricks of your bid. This arose in the semi-finals of the 2011 Vanderbilt (USA Open Teams):



WEST	NORTH	EAST	SOUTH
3H	X	3H	5S
Pass	6S	All Pass	

As you can see, 7S is a great contract. The 3H opening (7 losers = 6 playing tricks = within 3 tricks of the 3H opening bid), combined with East's further pre-empt (anyone for 5D by East as a lead-directing bid?), robbed North-South of the room needed to explore for the grand slam. Not so at the other table:

WEST	NORTH	EAST	SOUTH
2D (1)	3C	Pass	3S
Pass	5H (2)	Pass	6H (3)
Pass	7S	All Pass	

- (1) Weak two in hearts or spades
- (2) Exclusion Key Card Blackwood
- (3) SQ + 2 key cards outside hearts

North's 5H asked for key cards outside hearts. When South showed two plus the SQ, North was prepared to bid 7S and rely on no loser in clubs.
