You may have noticed that there have been changes to our Club Rooms – two huge screens!

The idea for a Multi-media System was put to the Committee in 2019 and in 2020 the Club, successfully applied to Rockingham City Council for a grant to help cover the cost. Finally, in 2021, despite some minor technical problems, Dave Clark and Peter Priestly have set up the system and will be showing Directors and Teachers how to use it.

Some of the things the system can do:

- any website can be displayed
- anything on the Director's computer can be shown
- anything on a USB stick or output from DVD,
 CD, smart phone or laptop
- can be displayed
- o live TV or TV apps can be watched

In fact, any visual display can be put on the screens.

- Teachers can put up their lessons and notes for their class to view.
- The screens can show the Club's website, the Bridge topic of the day, club notices etc, before play starts.
- At the Director's discretion, each table's progress can be shown, how many tables are

waiting for the next round, half time and full time scores and percentages.

We also have a laptop computer donated by the City of Rockingham that is connected to the screens. No need to leave the playing area to look at the computer!

Deep-and-Meaningfuls #16

Paul Brayshaw taps into the innermost thoughts of Deep Finesse®...

Saturday club sessions have a charm all of their own, you think to yourself as you enjoy the relaxed chatter after the game in the early evening, the sun's last gasp illuminating the peaceful surrounds. A rare outing for you, too. As you bring the beverage of choice to your lips and look with pleasurable expectation at the hand record in front of you, your ears pick out a nearby conversation that seems to be going slightly off the rails.


"... but you can't, because they're going to ruff the fourth spade. I'm telling you, you can't make a grand!"

"You must be able to, computer says so!"

"Well, it's not always right, I've found..."

This sounds like the perfect moment to intervene, as any further progression of the conversation would be likely to result in blasphemy against your dear friend, Deep Finesse (DF). You kindly ask the pair in question to share their little problem with you.

"Board 26. It says EW can make 7D, but there's no way you can do it. Look...". A second hand record is flung in your direction, which you deftly intercept.



The plaintiff continues: "You need to ruff a club in the West hand, but can't discard them on the spades because South will ruff in. So, I can see no way of avoiding a club loser."

You instantly recognise this scenario and its associated solution, and a superficial look at the hand confirms your thoughts. 7D is indeed cold.

You glance down at DF's matrix of numbers to confirm this, noticing that the format looks a little different today. Must be a hand-generating software update or something, you think to yourself.

"Well," you say to the other pair, "actually, the analysis is correct and you can make 7D. Funnily enough, you're looking in the wrong hand for losers – it is the West hand you need to concentrate on. You have three heart losers and two club losers. The heart losers are ruffed in the East hand and then the club losers are discarded on the spades after drawing trumps. This is a dummy reversal."

Slightly glazed eyes and pained expressions greet you, so you decide that a trick-by-trick breakdown of the play might be in order.

"What opening lead did you get in 6D?", you ask. "Oh, right, you were in 6NT. Let's assume the CI lead against 7D, then. You win this, then play the HA and ruff a heart in hand. Next, a spade to dummy and ruff a third heart. Then, another spade to dummy and ruff the fourth heart with the DJ. Note now that dummy has more trumps than declarer, so you have got the same one-trick advantage from ruffing losers as you would have by ruffing a single loser in the short hand, which you couldn't do on this hand. Now, it is simply a matter of playing ace and another trump, using dummy's holding to draw trumps. You discard that club loser from hand on the third trump, and now you can play a club back to your hand, which is good."

You see lights go on and faces with reduced contortions, which you interpret as comprehension, then go back to examining that unusual-looking matrix. You notice some new text written below it in a tiny font: "Powered by Solvitt®". What is that?

"Please, what is Solvitt?" you ask aloud, realising that you have just taken a leaf out of DF's book. Her influence has surfaced in many places since the blossoming of your friendship, much to the amusement of your peers. An experienced player nearby pipes up:

"That's the new application that finds and displays all makeable contracts and interfaces with the dealing software," they say. Your heart skips a beat. "It's great, because it has so many more features than Deep Finesse. You can have a Solvitt account, which allows you to enter hands manually for analysis, and it even uses OCR technology so you can take a picture of a hand record to save you time entering it."

"Right...", you manage, suppressing the rather more raw and violent feelings you have inside. Remember not to shoot the messenger, you repeat to yourself. Your tormentor continues:

"Once it has produced its analysis, you have the option of selecting your system and the opponents' system, and it will then give you the suggested auction to get to the optimal contract."

"But you shouldn't reach half the contracts that D..., that Solvitt, says you can make!" you blurt out. "It simply says what's possible, not what contracts you should be in. A lot of the time, the correct declarer play or defence on a particular hand is an anti-percentage line! And on other hands, you can make game or slam without the appropriate values simply because the layout is so favourable! How can you be in any position to bid to those contracts?"

"Yep. But it's what people want these days, and someone has finally filled this niche with an app to replace Deep Finesse, which is over 20 years old. I expect it will become the standard. You can even share the results of a hand analysis on social media – I think someone even got a "like" for it once. It's looking more likely that bridge won't be played at a table at all in another 20 years."

You feel the urgent need to remove yourself from company, so you mumble some excuse and set off for home. This miserable turn of events has not only depressed you beyond measure, you now have grave fears for DF herself. You know very well that being of use is important to her, and that any slight on her abilities or reduction in her workload hits a sensitive nerve, or neural network, however her mind works. You dread the prospect of being the bearer of such bad news.

Later that night, after a fitful few hours lying awake worrying about the Solvitt situation, you eventually drift off and feel yourself descending DF's special staircase into her odd little realm. You find her practising some manoeuvres with her little playing-card troupe, trying to get them to

loop in a figure-of-eight, by the looks of it. She turns and produces one of her lovely smiles when she sees you. The cards scatter and lazily hover in the background.

"Hello," she says, "I've been trying to see how much control I have over them by attempting some tricks – I think they're going to need a bit more practice! Oh dear, what's wrong?"

Your glum face has obviously given the game away. You explain to her what you observed on the hand record earlier, and what the other player had to say about Solvitt. DF produces one of her pretty laughs when you mention some of the newfangled features of the rival software.

"I've been watching people play this game for over 20 years", she says. "For them, the joy of it seems to come from interacting with each other at the table, not from analysing the cards in private (you happen to be an exception). Their card-playing ability reflects this. These extra 'features' are not going to catch on, believe me. I am able to analyse all the hands in the world at a far greater rate than I need to, so I'm sure that I shall have plenty of work well into the future. You need not be concerned for me!"

She takes your hand, and you gaze at those mesmerising fingers of hers with those shimmering, ever-changing diamonds. DF looks you in the eye. "You still look worried", she continues. "Come on, tell me about a hand to take your mind off it, before I come up with one for you!"

Your mind groans at the thought of one of her latenight 'specials', so you quickly describe the earlier hand to her, with the playing cards obligingly forming the deal in front of you.

"I liked this one because I knew what to do in 7D the moment I heard the story from some other players, even before I saw the hand record," you explain. "EW can make 7D on a dummy reversal."

"Please, what is a dummy reversal?", she asks. "Would you like me to display dummy's cards from lowest to highest instead?"

"No, no, no!", you say with a giggle. "A dummy reversal is where you ruff enough times with the long trumps to make them shorter than the 'short' side, then you draw trumps with the short side, which is usually dummy."


"Oh, that", she says. "That doesn't happen very often, I find."

"No, which is why people often miss it. So, on the CJ lead..."

"Try a trump lead. Or a spade. That's much more interesting," she interrupts.

"All right. On a spade lead I have one fewer entry to dummy, so I'll have to use trumps for one of my entries. That means a blockage. Hmmm... but wait, I've got it! I win the spade, play ace and another heart to ruff small. Now I play a small diamond to the king and ruff a heart with the DJ, and then a spade to dummy."

The cards scurry to create the current position:



"Now, I ruff the last heart with the DA! This allows me to draw trumps by finessing against South's DT. On the last trump, I discard the C6 and the East hand is now good."

"Wonderful," she says. "And how about that trump lead?"

"Well, if I stick in the nine, that solves all my entry problems. But, I could still win this with the king instead. Either way, I play it roughly the same way as for a spade lead, ruffing hearts with both the DA and DJ; I only have to ruff with one of those honours on a club or heart opening lead."

"Too easy! Try this one..." she says.

Please, show mercy, you think to yourself as the cards start to form a brute of a hand. You gaze at your friend with mixed feelings as she concentrates on the layout. Is she really not in danger of becoming obsolete? After all, she is merely the soul of some software that is likely to be superseded very soon, especially with the rate and enthusiasm of uptake of new things these days. You cannot bring yourself to think of a life without her now, and banish the thought to the very back of your mind. At any rate, it is not the future, it is now. And she is happy. And so are you.



Western Seniors

From David Schokman

It has long been my considered opinion that the best bid in bridge is the PASS and there is nothing that you can say to me that will change this unshakeable belief that I hold. After the Western Senior's event I chose a deal to write about, and half way through writing said to myself "I'd better call Nigel". There were two reasons, the first one was that it was only Marie France and Nigel who found the perfect spot, of 6C, (by accident he says) and the other is that almost, without exception, the first hand that we pick, to write about, from any weekend event is the same. However, we are writing with a different tack, and you would have read his column on May 22^{nd} , while this will appear in the June edition of Focus.



You all know what happened at Nigel's table. 1C by him (strong). 3S by Ron Cooper as he believes in competing strongly against strong club openings. Please do not consider a bid like this unless you are at least half as good a player as Ron is.

All other pairs would see west opening with a bid of 1H. 2S by north, – showing a weak six card suit. 3H by east. At this vulnerability south can chose to bid a high number of spades, and hope that the opponents can be shut out of the bidding. This is where I stick my neck out and say that south should pass. I can almost hear the screams of derision, with the kinder epithets being "wimp" and "bidding coward". But please consider. Your partner has made a weak bid and you have six card trump support. This means that one opponent has a void in spades, and once you confirm that you

have a good spade fit it is going to be so much easier for your opponents to find their way to a slam, and correctly place any cards of importance.

So my recommendation is that south passes. Now I do not know how the bidding will proceed but if your opponents stop short of a vulnerable slam let them play there. However, if they find their way to 6H I would now advise the person sitting south, to rise, like Lazarus, and bid 6S. This advice only applies to bidding at this vulnerability. At our table it was 1H - (2S) - 3H - (3S) - 4H - (4S) - 5H - (5S)- 6H - long think, and 6S bid by south. The contract was doubled, and this excellent sacrifice went unrewarded as not enough pairs bid and made the slam, some even failing to make 12 tricks in 6H. This now comes down to how you play the heart suit. Everyone of you must have heard the old adage/axiom, "eight ever: nine never", this of course referring as whether you should take the finesse against the queen when you hold nine trumps. With eight you always take the finesse, and with nine you play for the drop, unless you are aware of other distributional information that would change the odds.

What has changed? Both north and south have six spades each. You have a void and your partner has a singleton. Would/could this distributional pattern be mirrored in the opponent's hands? Sadly no, as there is no logical, or mathematical, justification to expect similar shapes in the other hands. So you play one top honour first and then go to dummy and play the knave. No south player will/should ever cover the knave, so you are on your own to make the decision. So if you always play for a drop with nine it is better to continue as you have no additional information to change your pattern of play. That is probably why players failed to make 12 tricks.


One of my partner's, Dave Munro, has been vying to win the Western Seniors event for some years and this time with Fiske Warren he did it. They never lost a match and had one of the most comprehensive wins seen in this event by 19 victory points.

The unluckiest pair were Florence Maltby and Di Brooks. They played consistently good bridge and never moved further away from table two, being in the top four pairs for 7 of the 9 rounds. Then in the last round they had a bidding misunderstanding on a tough board (number 17) and lost 1100 - 15 imps on it - keeping them out of second spot.

Defence at Joondalup

Over the years it is possible that many bridge writers have raised the question as to what the most important aspect of bridge is. Obviously bidding has to be right there near the top, because without knowing how to bid you cannot play the game. The next is being declarer, and if you do not possess, even the most basic rules, you will be of no use to yourself or anyone else at the bridge table. Then you are dummy, where your obligations are very clearly laid out in the rules. However, many of us may have behaved as dummies sitting in any position at the table! Then we have DEFENCE, and surely this has to be the most important aspect of the game if for one reason only, and that is because we defend twice as much as we do anything else. Most of the rules of defence are laid out very clearly, but at trick one you are the most important person at the table. A lot of the time your choice of card will be very easy and just routine, but then there are times when have to put your thinking cap on and chose a path that has not been trodden on before. This was one of those hands from the Joondalup Congress Swiss pairs in February.



Let's not beat around the bush. South is always going to open the bidding with 1D. As far as north is concerned they are going places, depending on the next bid that south makes, and bids 1H. East is delighted to pass. Does south bid 2D or 1S, both bids limiting the hand to some degree. The choice is probably a question of style. North cannot bid 2H, as that bid can be passed, and needs to be innovative, but has no real problem with a bid of 2C, or 3C as the need may be. Over 3C, fourth suit forcing, south will have no hesitation in bidding 3NT.

You are on lead as west. What is your choice? If south had not bid a spade it would probably have been an easy choice, but the natural lead of a low spade would have given the contract away, and it was made, three times on this lead. Surprisingly many stopped in part scores and even bid to 5D.

At our table David Matthews and I found our way to 3NT. Our opponents were Egmont Melton and John Beddow, a long - standing bridge partnership. Egmont was on lead and after some thought he selected the queen of hearts, confident that south did not have any support for his partner's suit. This was a killing lead, and the queen was followed by a low heart, won with the nine. John Beddow switched to the obvious club and David was forced to take the losing finesse. Back came another heart to the ten. The contract should have gone more down but John, holding the diamond queen, could not risk declarer taking six diamond tricks, and cashed the ace of hearts, defeating the contract.

Most of us defend like robots, obviously following accepted rules but often unthinkingly. Then we go home and find that Deep Finesse has found the killing lead, something that we may have found ourselves, if we took a few seconds before we laid down that first card. So in my opinion defence is certainly the most important aspect of the game as you often have to think outside of the box.

Finding Nemo

Finding game is almost like the film "Finding Nemo". Players new to the game of bridge are nervous in their bidding, especially when partner opens 1S and their hand is a poor 6-9 with a 6-card suit and no support for the opener. What is their best option? I advise them to check out their choices ... Maybe looking at what they shouldn't do!


a/ Can they support partner? No, well look at some other bid.

b/ Can they bid their own suit at the 2 level? No, not if holding 6 - 8 points.

c/ Can they pass? No, then what's the best bid out? 1NT

Newbies tend to look at their meagre point holding and think "I've only got", panic and pass, forgetting that the opener has a range of points, (depending on their system). So, let's look at a few hands taken from Mandurah's Saturday session.

Board 3



East, vulnerable, opened 3S and not surprisingly, everyone passed.

Looking at the quality of the spades and the outside DA, the hand should be opened 4S.

Board 7

South passed, West opened 1D, North overcalled 1H, East bid 1S, South passed, West followed up with 2C. All Pass.


East held AJ109, K, Q10963, QJ2

The points were there for game in Clubs, Slam in Diamonds and eleven tricks in No Trumps. So, what could East do? Well, he could have asked in the opener had a holding in hearts by bidding 2H after the opener had rebid 2C. Then the final contract would have been 3NT.

Holding 13 points opposite an opening hand, game was on. Don't just pass, bid something new, or take the reins and go for game or slam in Diamonds.

Board 18

East, Dealer, opened with 1S, South passed, and West bid 2NT. (This bid in Acol shows 10-12 points as it does in Precision. The old school Standard American shows game going). East, having the minimum of points, passed. The final contract: 2NT+1.



So, what other options did West have?

a/ Bid a new suit at the 2 level, promises 10+ pts Opener MUST respond

b/ Can't support spades, can't bid hearts, bid game: 3NT

c/ Pass was NEVER an option.


Board 30

East 1D, S Pass, West 1H, N Pass,

East 2C, S Pass, West 2H, N Pass

East 2NT, S Pass, West 3NT.

The point to this example was the 2H rebid by West. This showed 6 - 9 pts and no interest in game.



Ok, the pair got to game, but on the rebid of the hearts at such a low level, the pair might have missed game.

What was West's options after East showed his Clubs?

- a/ Pass was never an option, as West has too many points.
- b/ Can't support Clubs.
- c/ Raise in Diamonds. Not an option.
- d/ Bid 3NT This bid protects West's Spade King.

Each of the pairs playing these boards have a few years of bridge under their belt. For people new to bridge, they have a lot to learn. As I tell them, We are never too old to learn and lastly, we keep on learning.








Test Your Slam Play



SOLUTION



Begin by playing two more rounds of trumps ("just for lurkers"), leaving just one more trump in your hand. Your hand is a mystery to the defenders – perhaps someone will unwisely discard a club.

Next cash the club ace and king. If all follow, meaning clubs divided 3-2, then give up a club and claim your contract. But if as you suspected, West started with 4 clubs, the position is now:



As long as West has the • K, you are home and dry. Play your last trump. West can throw a club, as you no longer have the entry to your hand to set up a club. Discard a diamond from dummy, and take the diamond finesse, which you need to work.

Finally play a club from dummy to endplay West into giving you another diamond finesse.

The moral: Look after those little cards! The most important card on this deal is dummy's ♣6. If at any point on the run of the hearts, you discard a club from dummy, the contract is doomed, as you will have lost your end-playing card.


The Play's the Thing

SOLUTION

It was considered that at world-class level most of the swings came from bidding methods and bidding judgment. The standard of card play was generally equal. Patrick Jourdain, former editor of the International Bridge Press Association, commented at the world championships in Shanghai that this was no longer the case and that the standard of play has dropped at top level.

You might come to the same conclusion after this deal from the final of a National Open Teams where the swing was the result of declarer's play shortfall.



At one table North-South reached 3NT without interference via 1H: 1S, 2D: 3C (fourth-suit), 3NT: Pass. The lead was the CQ: four – king – seven and declarer won the club return. The D2 went to the queen and ace and when the D9 came back, South took it with the DK. He led the S10 and let it run. East won and cashed the DJ, but that was the end of the defence. N-S +400.

At the other table, after the auction given, West led the CQ. Declarer won trick 1 with the CA and played a heart to the king. He cashed the SA, SK to pitch the club loser and continued with a heart to the ace. Now there was no entry to dummy to benefit from the favourable lie in diamonds.

The H10 was won by the jack and the SQ return was ruffed. A diamond went to the queen and king and East returned the CK. South ruffed with his last trump and so the defence scored two heart tricks and two diamonds for +50 and +10 Imps.

One comfortable winning line, indicated by West's 3C bid, is CA, HA, HK, SA, SK (pitch club), D3 to the D10. The defence is limited to two trumps and the DA.
