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# President's Report

This year November is certainly a busy month, The Super Vets on the 10th and the Golden West on the weekend of the 16th. Both of these Gold Point events have impressive fields and should be great events. This year BAWA is holding two extra events one in November and one in December. The November event is a two day team event starting on November 23. Subject to a minimum of 10 teams entering BAWA will pay the entry fee for the APBF Teams in Perth 2020 for the winning team in the category of the team's choice. The pair's event in early December will also, subject to the same 10 table condition, have a great prize. BAWA will pay 50% the entry fee for the APBF Teams in Perth 2020 for the pairs finishing first and second. Full details for all aforementioned events can be found on the BAWA web site.

The APBF Congress in April next year will be the biggest bridge event in WA since Brazil won the Bermuda Bowl at the Hyatt in 1989. The congress is open to ALL players and is an event not to be missed. This will be a rare opportunity to play against international players. 



# **Double Trouble**

From Marnie Leybourne

To double or not to double, that is the question...

Consider that you, sitting East - all Vulnerable, are holding the following hand:



The bidding has gone:

WEST	NORTH	EAST	SOUTH
Pass	Pass	1 <b>.</b>	1♠
Pass	2♠ (cue raise)	2♥	4♠
Pass	Pass	?	

Do you double? Think about it, make your decision, and then read on.

This hand came up in a recent team's match that I was playing and it reminded me of an Abbot hand, so I apologise for plagiarising a little here to make my point. For those of you who don't get the reference to the Abbot, this is a character from a series of bridge books set mostly in a monastery.

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

One of the characters is the poor unfortunate Brother Anthony, who is a member of the silent Eustacian order with a lifelong ban against speaking. By necessity, Brother Anthony always passes so can never be declarer. 1 Anyway, Brother Anthony picks up the following:

★ KQJT▼ KJ★ KQJ★ KQJ

Not only does he have to pass throughout the auction, during which his opponents reach a contract of 5C, the other three monks at the table make a mockery of his Order and the pressure becomes too much for him. He cracks out a "double", much to the astonishment of the other players.

As his opponents wrap up 11 tricks, the Abbot yells at poor Brother Anthony, "What... do you mean by breaking your vow of silence, just to double a cold game?" These were the four hands:




Lead: Heart ten

I'll leave you to either work out how South made 11 tricks, or you can check out the book; it is probably in your club library. Hint: East's final four cards are his four trumps, while South holds ♥ 5 2 and ♠ T 6 and North is on play.

So, the answer to the question above is now obvious. You probably should not double holding this type of hand. Chances are there is distribution

around. In the match, the contract of 4S was doubled at one table and not at the other, at a cost of five imps as the contract made easily. Here are the hands:



So, when do you double? I am talking here of the penalty double, as that little red X is the second most useful bid in the bidding box. We use it for takeout, support, optional, lead directing, a "partner do something sensible" a "Lightener", D0P1/P0D1... You and your partner will (or should!) have your rules for when to use the X under these circumstances.

Penalty doubles are somewhat less scientific. Doubling any contract for penalties is a gamble, not just because the contract might make, but also because you might not reap as much as you could have had you bid on yourself. Taking a non-vulnerable doubled contract three light for +500 doesn't look good against your cold +620 had you bid your own game.

Here are a few points to consider:

- Have the opponents freely bid their game (such as the auction to 4S above)? Had South bid 2S (instead of 4S directly), followed by some game try by North and a stumble into 4S, then you should be whipping that red X like a flash.
- Has your partner squeaked at all? If they have made a bid, you are entitled to think they may have something useful in their hand.
- Do you hold lots of Aces and, if you have Kings are they supported by an Ace and not many other cards in the suit (reducing the chance that the Ace and/or King will be ruffed)? As you can see in both examples, KQJ holdings really aren't all that great.
- Has the bidding suggested relatively balanced hands with 4-4 in the trump suit? If you don't

have any, your partner must have trumps and, together with any Aces you hold, the contract is likely to fail, so bring out the red X.

• How competent is your opposition?

That last point is a minefield. I am NOT suggesting that beginners should be doubled and experienced players left alone. I mean it more whether you know if you can trust their bidding. In the above example, I was actually sitting South, playing with Trevor Fuller. Our opponent sitting East thought for quite some time before passing, knowing that Trevor's cue raise could be trusted and that I was bidding 4S to make.

Another take on that last point could also be that beginners should be doubled LESS frequently, as they generally tend to underbid their hands, and perhaps beginners should consider pulling out that red X against competent players if history indicates they frequently overbid against you. A few large negative scores will pull them back into line with greater respect for you as a player.

#### Happy doubling

One final point. Astute readers will have noticed I said the X was the second most useful bid in the box. I was making an assumption that everyone knows which one is the most useful... (and if you STILL don't know, it's the normally green one normally found at the front of the box! Some players would be advised to use it more often.)

Most declarers made 3NT after the spade lead (datum N-S 380). They won with the SA and took the diamond finesse. With no clue that West had good hearts, East returned a spade and South had ten tricks.

If declarer errs by taking trick 1 with the SK and playing DA and a second diamond. West has a chance to signal values in hearts. A McKenney C2 or odds-and-evens C2 is a request for hearts and discarding the S6 carries the same message. Even an encouraging card in hearts would work, as it happens, but it is usually not a good idea to discard a card from the suit you want if it might cost you a trick.





# Percentage Bridge

From David Schokman

Have you ever asked yourself why you make mistakes which are so unnecessary and often totally contrary to all the good rules of bridge? This deal was from a Swiss pair's event in the last round from a congress played in August and had the potential to have altered the result of the event, but it did not. Let's talk about it.



A cursory look at the hands is unlikely to set the pulse racing, but the results showed that there had been some opposition activity, and heavy penalties recorded. Let's start with south bidding 1H. Would Acol players open the bidding with 1NT? Probably not.

West passes, and north, using Jacoby, bids 2NT, which shows 12+ plus points and four card trump support. 3NT by south, which should show a good opening hand, without a singleton or void, or a second five card suit. This bid, also limits the hand to less than a 1NT opening of 15-17 points, if you were playing Standard. North bids 4C, which I believe must be a cue showing the ace of clubs. 4S by south, showing the spade ace. 4NT by north and when south shows three key cards, north bids 6H. A critical analysis cannot really fault the bidding, as north has only five losers to add to the seven, or less, with south. Is success going to depend on the diamond finesse, or will it be easy with south holding the king of diamonds rather that the king of clubs, which we can see.

West leads the three of spades and you take stock. Trumps will be no problem, and the diamonds will probably be on a guess. How about the spade lead? It is unlikely to be from the king: certainly not mud or a doubleton, ominously looks like a singleton. On this supposition it is a favourable lead and you play

low, winning the knave with your ace. Obviously, you have to consider the trump position and this is where the score sheet paints a dismal picture with pairs making only 10 tricks and failing to make 5H. Where did they go wrong? With the AKQ to nine trumps you do not envisage any problem, and I feel that the errors were more an act of carelessness rather than a lack of bridge knowledge. The one thing that you have to consider is whether the trump suit will break 4 -0. It is only a 9.57 pc chance, but something that you must not discount. Your cards allow you to pick up the knave wherever it is, and surely your bridge teacher always told you to play the first honour from the hand that has two honours. Sadly, too many pairs played a heart to the queen, which turned out to be a disaster. They will never make that mistake again. Once the trumps are picked correctly the spade lead allows you to establish a spade trick for a diamond discard, and, of course, the diamond king has to be favourably placed.

So, the accolades go to Eileen Reilly and Judith Wilson who bid and made 6H, one of two pairs who were successful. Congratulations ladies.

We have always been told to bid more aggressively at favourable vulnerability but surely the decision to bid 3S, after a 1H opening, followed by a Jacoby 2NT, was an act of sheer insanity. You have only achieved one thing and that is to warn your opponents of possible bad breaks, and certainly help them in placing cards when the contract is set.

The brickbats are to the three pairs. One doubled in 4S for minus 1400: the other pair doubled in 5C for 800. It should have been only 500. Some may say that 7C is a great save against 6H, but then your opponents did not bid it!

Possibly the worst decision was the double of 5H, holding J962 of hearts. I only imagine that it was made by the partner of one of the players who decided to bid 3S, which certainly should have had better values than they actually held.

So, remember that this is a game of total discipline – PERCENTAGE Bridge - was what my friend, the late Milton Miller, called it. Do not make foolish bids as they only help your opponents and misleads partner, destroying partnership confidence.



#### Board 8



With a little less enthusiasm if she decided on an invitational sequence I would accept the invite as my hand also has a good suit plus 9's and 10's. As I said, in the olden days when Directors didn't have the joy of using computer scoring programs, all the calculations were done by pen, paper and brain power.



# South Perth Bridge Club Pharmacy 777 Event

South Perth held a sponsored session on Friday, 18th October. With Jan Howell directing, there were fifteen and a half tables in play. Although I usually ask to sit N/S, due to health issues, partner Florence and I sat E/W.

Well, weren't we the lucky ones. The lay of the cards favoured E/W. Most were very basic until this hand came along -



The bidding was passed around to West, playing Precision, Florence opened 1D

North passed and I bid 1H, South called 2C and then Florence bid 4H. I didn't feel my hand was that brilliant and passed.

The lead was the Club King. Have a look at the four hands and give a guess on the final result! Deep Finesse says 6D, 7H, 7S, 7NT - difficult to believe. But the computer was right, although I did have some help from the opponents. The play went thus: CK won by CA. I now lead the H10, South covered with the Jack. On winning the trick with the HK, North dropped the HQ. Two more rounds of hearts took out the remaining trumps. Back in my hand, I played the DQ, covered by the DK, with Dummy's DA taking the trick. I lead the D9, covered by the D10 and won by my Jack. It was all over Red Rover. The spades fell nicely and any of the thirteen cards in Spades or Diamonds took care of my losing C10.

With hindsight, both on my part, (for not counting my points properly) and the fact that maybe a 4C bid from my partner would show her maximum point count. (Her opening 1D showed 11-15 points, no five card major, might not have any

diamonds either). From this I would gather partner had 4 hearts, maximum points and a singleton or void in Clubs. As I said, hindsight is a wonderful thing. This article proves you can fail to appreciate your points and failing to open, cost us the chance to bid the small slam.



## **Test Your Slam Play**

By Bill Jacobs

#### SOLUTION



You have 9 top tricks (4 spades, 2 hearts, 2 diamonds, 1 club) so are looking for three more.

They can come in one of two forms: a) two extra diamonds (from a successful finesse for  $\blacklozenge$  Q) and a club ruff, or b) one extra diamond and two club ruffs.

It would be nice to combine both chances, but entries to your hand are lacking. If you take a diamond finesse at trick two and it fails, when a trump is returned, you no longer have the communications to ruff two clubs.

You must give up on plan a) and pursue plan b): taking two club ruffs. Play ♣A and ruff a club. Next make the key play: ◆J from dummy!

When East wins ◆Q, everyone, including dummy, will be surprised, and start wondering if you've forgotten to take your medication. Nevertheless, after a second trump is played by the defence, you will simply ruff another club, return to your hand by ruffing a heart, draw the outstanding trump (on which dummy's last heart is discarded), and claim the remaining diamonds.

The moral: Medication is important; thinking through the play even more so.
