President's Report

I sat on an appeal committee other day, the appeal was quite complex and took quite some

time both before and during the hearing. The director also spent a large amount of time preparing his submission to the committee - as did the players involved. I mention this because ALL of the time and ALL of the angst and ALL of the effort would have been unnecessary had the players involved called the director at the time of the initial infraction. Instead they made their own decision to carry on and when a "discussion" at the end of the hand began - then the director was called. The appeal was upheld and an adjusted score was awarded which compensated for damage caused by misinformation. However, the point of mentioning all of this was to report that both pairs were given a significant IMP penalty for failing to call the director at the time he should have been called.

A similar circumstance came to my attention the other day - at a local club session a player claimed the remaining tricks in a contract, clearly stating a line of play. The opponent disagreed. The claimant offered to play the hand. WRONG. The situation then developed into a heated "he played this", "she played that", "no I didn't" emotional and unpleasant experience. The director arrived sorted the matter all's well. Not really. I would have encouraged the director to settle the final result of the contract and then fine both pairs "a top" or whatever, for failing to call the director when the claim was disputed. Let it be clear - if you claim and the opponents disagree you cannot now play the hand. The director must be called immediately. OK so you may not know all of these rules - so here is an easy one for you. For ANY INFRACTION or ANY DISAGREEMENT at the table the director must be called IMMEDIATELY.

You may recall that some 3 years ago BAWA held a Special General Meeting to endorse the concept that BAWA should find a permanent home as a junior partner with the Melville Bridge Club. A Memorandum of Agreement between Melville and BAWA was duly signed. Melville had been offered a substantial redevelopment / re-location at Tompkins Park in Ardross. In the end, mainly due to cost, the council shelved the Tompkins Park proposal but did offer the club an excellent alternative. I am pleased to report that after much blood, sweat and tears, mostly for the Melville committee, the end does appear to be in sight; at a recent most cordial and fruitful meeting with the CMBC committee a new Memorandum was concluded. The council suggests the first quarter of 2018 as the timetable for the move. Watch this space.

At the recent ANC a player in the Victorian Open Team also played in the Restricted Butler - an event for players with less than 300 master points. This caused some angst and the ABF was asked to examine the definition of "a restricted player" with the aim of having it more accurately reflect the spirit of the restricted category. 300 master points is very easy to check and enforce and requires no "decisions" to be made. Because of this the ABF have decided that the current definition of restricted player will be maintained. BAWA has also examined the issue and is considering the idea that a restricted player should have less than 300 master points of which no more than 100 can be Gold points. As you may know Gold master points are won at national events. Your views, as always, would be welcome. John Beddow is the TC Secretary and his email details are on our web site.



This event is open to ALL bridge players in WA – all players of all levels of experience are welcome.

Players who do not wish to contend for selection are more than welcome to play in this stage. This will be a 6 week event of quality bridge.

This stage will qualify 5 pairs for Stage 2. After non-contending pairs are removed, the winning pair from Stage 1 will qualify for the team. Pairs finishing 2nd - 5th will qualify for Stage 2, the Team Final. The pair finishing 2nd will pick team-mates from the pairs finishing 3rd, 4thor 5th. The remaining 2 pairs will form a team; these 2 teams will contest a 64-board final. The Interstate team will consist of the Stage 1 winners plus the team winning the final.

N.B. As the format consists of only one qualifying stage Yellow Systems will be permitted. Yellow Systems may ONLY be played by contending pairs. Furthermore, system cards MUST be lodged with the BAWA webmaster (bawa@bawa.asn.au) before midnight Tuesday 26 January 2016. Other than the minimum board requirement all other regulations for Yellow Systems apply.

If you are keen to improve your standard of play then playing in BAWA events is a must. ALL players of ALL standards are welcome. Don't forget BAWA events carry the highest rating (double congress rate) for those hard to earn RED MASTER POINTS.

I will now give you a number of different diamond holdings. Your job is to:

(A) Decide which card to play; and

(B) Rate how difficult your decision was (1 = easy, 2 = moderately hard, 3 = very hard).

1) A654

- 2) Q54
- 3) 654
- 4)4

The answers:

1) There is no right answer – either the ace or the four might be right. So if you thought that this was a tough decision you were right to rate it 3 – very hard. If declarer has the singleton J, then the ace is probably right. With just one diamond, declarer is odds on to rise with the king if you play small, thereby losing no diamond tricks. But say declarer's diamonds are J10. Then he has to guess whether to play you or partner for the queen in order to lose only one trick in the suit.

2) Again, no right answer, but this time, the queen is probably the right play. I would rate this one 2 – moderately hard. You will solve declarer's guess if he has J10, but if you don't play the queen and he has D J6, he will have pulled a "swifty" and made a diamond trick when he has no right to.

3) The right answer is either the 6 (if you are playing reverse count) or the 4 if you play natural count or you don't play count signals. This one rates an easy 1 on the difficulty scale.

4) No prizes for the right answer here – you only have one card to play. Hopefully everyone gave this a 1.

In particular, I want to talk about problems 3 and 4. In both these circumstances, you have an easy decision as to what to play. The Laws require you to play in normal tempo. You are not allowed to try to bamboozle the opposition by means of the speed with which you play a card. If you have no legitimate bridge reason for thinking about what card you are going to play and the opponent may be deceived by it, the director can award an adjusted score. That means if you get a good score because of the deception, the director will take it away.

The great majority of players are not guilty of any deliberate trickery here. However, under the laws of bridge even if you accidentally lead the opponent astray by an unwarranted slow play, the director will award an adjusted score. Let's assume that in # 4 above (holding the singleton four), the time comes to play it. If you do play it slowly, consider what it looks like from declarer's point of view. You "obviously" have choice of cards to play and have eventually decided on the D4. Now it may be the case that you may have got yourself momentarily distracted and so delayed playing the four. You may have been thinking about what to play next, or wondering about why your partner didn't take his ace at Trick 1, or you may be thinking about how hungry you are and wouldn't be good if the director called the lunch break now! In none of these cases are you trying deliberately deceive declarer. However to because of your behaviour, declarer is led to think that you had a difficult decision. If he goes astray and there is the possibility that he may have done better, the director will probably change the score. There is no suggestion that you were intentionally trying to fool declarer. If the director does award an adjusted score, you should accept it with good grace and be more careful in future. All players should know to be particularly careful to play in tempo when holding a singleton.

So, is there anything you can do to alleviate matters if you find yourself in such a situation? The answer is **YES** - Look at these two scenarios...

1) You don't have a significant choice of what card to play to this trick, but you are worried about how the hand might play out in a few tricks time and so would like to think about it now. Place the card you intend to play to this trick face down on the table and announce that you would just like to think about the hand. In this way, the opposition are not misled about your play to this trick – you just turn it over when you are ready.

2) You suddenly realise that you have delayed the play of a card and you haven't had any reason to do so. It may be that you were thinking about another trick. Or it could be that you thought you were about to discard and suddenly unexpectedly find a card of the suit led. Or you might be going to take a card from your hand and you fumbled about so that it appears that you are making a choice of which card to play. Or it could have been that you were looking out the window and not concentrating, and everyone thought you were mulling over what to play. By making a comment along the lines of "Sorry, I didn't have anything to think about", you can lessen your unintended swindle. In some cases, this will give the opponent a clue as to how to play the hand, but that is the consequence of your previous action.

Perhaps the most important message to be learnt is that if the opponents do call the director and he does award an adjusted score, there is no suggestion that anyone is cheating. An innocent player has been innocently deceived by the careless actions of another. The purpose of the laws is to try to put things right in such a situation.



The C3 is led to 6H. This is not the right contract, but you can always claim that "matchpoints made me do it".

Plan the play.

Solution:



The lead indicates that East has six clubs to West's one.

There are seemingly 12 top tricks, but the problem is in the diamond suit: if it breaks 3-1, the suit is probably blocked, and you cannot get to dummy's fifth diamond. The only solution is to discard your fourth diamond on one of dummy's spades – but you must do this without letting East in to cash his clubs.

Win CA, and lead the seven of spades. To defeat you, East must put the eight on this, but more probably, he will play SA. Ruff high, lead H5 to H8, and play S10. If that is covered, ruff high again, play H9 to H10, and, assuming hearts divide 3-2, play S9. Finally, you will be able to discard a blocking diamond on this card, and when West wins, there is nothing he can do.

If you had led the S10 at trick 2, East can afford to play SA, but still cover the next two spades plays dooming your slam.

The moral: *If someone asks you how to play a suit of 1097 opposite a void, don't laugh.*



Lead Directing Doubles ... (danger danger ... Will Robinson)

At a recent South Perth Saturday afternoon bridge session an amazing set of boards had been produced.

There were 6/6 hands 6/5 hands, singletons, voids, slams and grand slams at virtually every table throughout the 28 boards played during the session.

Only 9 boards failed to produce a game or slam and even some of those showed wild distribution.

The board featured here was opened by my partner, Dave Munro, sitting east. We had agreed to play Standard and he opened 1NT. South passed. It was my turn. My intention was to bid 2D as a transfer to hearts and then bid 3S showing a 5/4 hand in the majors with game values.

However when I bid 2D North doubled, no doubt as a lead direction for their partner.

Dave now made a very clever bid. He redoubled. South passed and it was now my turn again. Now Dave and I are not a seasoned partnership having only played a couple of times previously and these sorts of bidding sequences don't come along very often - but I took Dave's redouble to be optional - Bid my hearts at the 2 level if I were weak or bid 3NT if looking for game as he had the D's covered ... OR play the contract myself in 2DXX...

Had we been vulnerable I would have bid 3NT but we were not vulnerable so I passed. This is where knowing the score table helps. I felt 2DXX would beat a Non-vulnerable game contract score of +400 but I wasn't sure about it beating a vulnerable game score of +600. As it turns out -2DXX vulnerable scores +760.


I actually misplayed the hand and only came to 8 tricks whereas Deep Finesse said that 9 tricks were available ... but I made my contract for +560 and a top board ... and a visit from the Director after his scoring program alerted him to a possible anomaly. 9 tricks are makeable by taking North side suits off them and then playing a

Diamond. With only Diamonds left in their hand North would have had to give me a third D trick.

In my view this hand gives a valuable lesson to those players wanting to give partner a lead directing double when the opposition have the bulk of the points. Make sure your suit is worth a lead directing double.

6 Diamonds to the AQ wasn't enough. North needed at least AKJTxx or AQJTxx .

They then have 5 D tricks and 1 trick from Partner gives them 6 tricks and the contract would have been 1 off.



SOLUTION



After the auction given, North is worth game. South is competing opposite possibly no values and North has 6 HCP and great shape. Which game should North choose? It is tempting to jump to 4S, but South's double has not guaranteed four spades.

In such situations, it is often best to bid the opponents' suit to show values and indicate doubt as to the best contract. One option is 4D for North. If partner continues with 4H, North removes that to 4S, offering partner the choice between 4S and 5C. With the actual hand South will pass 4S, which makes comfortably.




