

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

The regular hall was converted for the occasion to a food court for the breaks and (free) lunch. The JBC congress is renowned for its culinary treats, and Maureen Aldridge and her team of volunteers exceeded themselves again with a veritable food fest. Just ask anybody who attended.

It is of course the competition that brought the players to the congress. After a spate of late withdrawals and cancellations, 56 pairs competed for 11 prizes in 5 categories, totalling \$1,980 in prize money. From the outset, John Beddow and Egmont Melton made it clear they meant business. They moved quickly to table #1 and with an attitude of "bring it on" brushed off every challenger afterwards. They put together a perfect

6-0 record to be the undisputed winners. Last year's winners Beata Bieganski and Lilia Male were runners-up this time around, their lone defeat coming at the hands of John and Egmont in round 4. Kimberly Zhao and Mark Goddard (3rd) and Gerry Daly and Tom Lemann (4th) took home the other prizes in the Open category.

10 pairs competed in the Novice (<300MP) class with the top prize going to Dawn Duly and Peter Wilson in 11th position. Dawn and Peter were one of 3 teams to finish with a 5-1 record! Placing second in the Novice class were Carol Thomas and Eddie Pozarowszsyk (17th). Carol and Eddie were also the 2nd placed IBC pair.

The Super Novice (<150MP) class had 11 pairs competing and top prize went to Nicki McGrath and Andrea McCallum (15th). They too posted a remarkable 5-1 record! Ziggy Morawiec and Shirley Lavarack (18th) claimed 2nd in this category.

The JBC congress also recognises those players who are just starting their bridge journey, ie players with less than 50MP's. It takes special courage to take on the State's best in a competition like this! It was a clean sweep for the local JBC members, with Jim Hewitt and Noreen Byrne (42nd) taking home the prize money, ahead of Sandra Wilson and Mark Ellaway (46th).

Finally, a record 41 JBC members played in this year's congress, and the prize for best placed JBC pair went deservedly to David Coulter and Pauline Coulter who finished 8th overall. Carol Thomas and Eddie Pozarowszsyk were the second best placed JBC pair whilst a tremendously strong afternoon performance propelled Elinor Shaw and James Shaw to narrow 3rd place, just ahead of Cathy Simmonds and Nesha Shah, David Wheaton and Jeanette StLedger, Anu Shah and Manuela Steinbrecher, Ann Hopfmuller and Claudine Lapere and Nilesh Shah/Daphne Field. Well done to all JBC players.

At the reception after the congress, President Dirk Lapere thanked Neville Walker and Brian for an impeccably run congress and congratulated all players for their wonderful sportsmanship.






Gambling

If you like gambling I would suggest that you go to the Burswood casino and try the pokies or start playing poker. But then poker requires a totally different skill base, and we will not go there. However, if you want to be successful at bridge I beg of you to play with discipline as that is the only way to do it. I have spoken previously about Percentage bridge, but that has nothing to do with it. I am actually referring where many of us feel that we can use (twist) a convention, to somehow justify using it to match what cards we hold in our hands. What you should remember that these conventions have been given to us by experts and are tried and proven methods for achieving success. How often do we think that we can do better, often in an attempt to fool our opponents but only succeed in confusing our partners. The deal is from a Saturday afternoon session at Nedlands in December last year. This might jog some memories which have been placed in the dark recess of your minds never to remembered.



I am neither an expert nor a bridge teacher, but by any stretch of imagination you cannot open the bidding on the is hand showing a weak two-suiter, particularly at this vulnerability. Some did, opening with a bid of 2S and you will see a score of minus 1400 for E/W on the score sheet. However, I have been reliably informed that three of the bidders did not crown themselves with glory! In normal circumstances north would open 1H. After partners pass east should be more conservative of an opening of 1H and should pass, but we cannot

be overly critical of anyone who bids 2D. South will pass, as should west. North will double and everyone will pass quite happily as west is not ashamed on what there is on offer. The deuce of hearts is led and the defence collects two hearts tricks; two spade tricks; two trump tricks and the ace of clubs. N/S could well pick up three trump tricks. Heart lead. Cash the ace and queen, followed by the ace and king of spades. Then play a heart. Whatever declarer does I believe that he/she has to lose three trump tricks on this defence. Now let us assume that east makes a disciplined pass and it is up to you as south. I would pass on this hand as all I can see is trouble though south can make nine tricks in clubs while north can make 10. On pair decided that they could make 11. More than half the field overbid in heart contracts and that is likely to happen if south decides that his hand justifies a bid. The big penalties were in 4S, doubled and two and three diamond doubled. The first only picking up +200 which still was a third top.

So, what are your feelings about the bidding and defence? Talk about it with your favourite expert and accept any advice that he/she have to offer you. My advice is, do not open the bidding on the west hand, and, if you are sitting south, I would pass my partners opening bid of 1H. Should east bid after north opens the bidding with 1H? At this vulnerability, probably not.

The Heart of Competitive Bidding

Competitive Bidding is an area we all strive to get better at. This was why I chose two great seminar topics on competitive bidding the last couple of weeks, and it sure did give lots of interesting ideas to everyone!

Take this hand for example:

★K942 ♥42 **♦** K982 **♣**765.

At nil vul, your partner opens 1♠ (5-card Majors) and our RHO overcalls 2♥, what do you do?

It might seem like an 'obvious 2 •' bid, but in today's world of competitive bidding, the way to win these auctions is to pressure your opponents into making the final guess (and hope they guess incorrectly!). By bidding a simple 2 •, we allow our LHO to raise freely to 3 •, or bid a new suit with 3 • or 3 •, or potentially show a good hand by jumping to 4 • or maybe a cuebid with 3 •.

This is why a preemptive raise to 3♠ now is best. This would show 4-card support with roughly 6-9 points. Because of our nine-card fit, we are quite safe playing in 3♠ since if we don't make it, quite likely the opponents can make a contract of their own and -50 or -100 is hardly going to be a disaster. Not only that, our partner may have a sixcard spade suit and could even raise it higher to 4♠ to sacrifice against the opponent's 4♥ contract.

In competitive auctions, it can be quite useful to cuebid the opponent's suit (here $3\heartsuit$) to show a fit with 10+ points. Partner just assumes we are 10-12 points and if he has a minimum, he can potentially sign off with $3\spadesuit$ and if we are much stronger, we can obviously raise to game.

By employing cue raises, this frees up the jump to 3-Major to play it as a 4-card preemptive raise, and this is the pinnacle of winning competitive auctions – maximise the pressure on your opponents and give them the last guess! Imagine if West had something like $\Delta Jxx \nabla Kxx \Delta Jxxx xx$ where he would've been comfortable competing to ΔT , but if we had preemptively raised to ΔT , he's in an awkward situation where passing may miss

out on a game (e.g. partner having $\Delta x \nabla AQJxxx \Delta ATx \Delta xxx$), or bidding $\Delta x \nabla AQJxxx \Delta xxx$ be a disaster (e.g. partner having $\Delta x \nabla AQJxxx \Delta xxx \Delta xxx \Delta xxx$ and $\Delta x \nabla AQJxxx$ may get doubled).

Here's another hand:

\$42 ♥AKJ942 \$85 \$942, with everyone vulnerable, partner opens 1\$ and RHO overcalls 1\$, what do you do?

This hand may not qualify for a $2 \heartsuit$ bid which should show $5 + \heartsuit$ and 10 + points, so people may compromise by making a Negative Double to show four hearts, planning to rebid $2 \heartsuit$ to show a weak hand with long hearts (picture the auction going $1 \diamondsuit - 1 \diamondsuit - X - P$; $1 \text{NT-P-} 2 \heartsuit$).

Although this hand does not equate to 10 points, I recommended bidding $2 \heartsuit$ anyway – with the idea that in competitive auctions, it is OK to shade a point or two if you have a long and decent suit. Here, by bidding $2 \heartsuit$, we are planning to rebid $3 \heartsuit$ to show $6+ \heartsuit$ and not enough to go to game.

What if partner bids to a game, expecting us to have 10 HCP? I'm not afraid at all, because game can still make! Picture partner having ♠xxx ♥xxx ♠Axx ♣AKJx − even with a minimal hand, the hearts will often come in for 6 tricks, so the tenth trick is on a club finesse (or if the opponents don't attack diamonds early enough, we may even try for a 3-3 club break).

Change our hand to $\mathbf{\Phi}Qx \mathbf{\nabla}Qxxxxx \mathbf{\Phi}Ax \mathbf{\Phi}xxx$ and now this 8 HCP hand is not good enough for a $2\mathbf{\nabla}$ bid, so you can compromise with a Negative Double.

Those were a couple of little tips that can go a long way for you to win more competitive auctions. If you're interested in more, I plan to run more of these workshops throughout the year. In fact, Alex Smirnov (a good friend of mine from Germany, and also the person who influenced me into teaching bridge!) will be giving two workshops focusing on declarer play on March 11th an 18th

at the WABC. Alex also runs the bridge holidays with me, and we have one planned in Noosa and a European Bridge Holiday in Budapest and Bratislava. For more information on the workshops, see the flyer.



The 1960 is Back!

No, that isn't a typo in the title. Read on and find out why.

I was having my usual afternoon nap on Monday, dreaming that I was on a boat sailing out of a harbour and sipping on a cocktail. Suddenly, I was rudely awakened by a swift kick in the shin. I opened my eyes to find myself at the bridge table, holding this hand:

- **◆** 543
- ♥ K82
- ♦ A8652
- 92

We play standard kicks, so I knew straight away what one kick under the table was asking for, a spade lead, so I tabled ♠5. "The auction hasn't finished yet. It's your bid," right-hand opponent informed me. I surmised they may have been the kicker, something I suspect is both illegal and also very difficult to prove.

I looked at the auction, which started with $2 \clubsuit$ on my left, pass by partner and $2 \spadesuit$ by the kicker.


Both bids had been alerted and I asked for a repeat of the explanation in case this part of the proceedings had already been covered during my slumber. Clearly it hadn't, but I was a long way past pretending to not having slept through the entire thing, so it didn't really matter.

- 2. was "wide ranging," and I nearly ended up back on my boat with the cocktail before we got to the end of all the possibilities. My main take away was that it could be anything from a pair of twos with a get out of jail free card, all the way up to two hotels on Mayfair and Park Lane.
- 2♦ seemed to serve no purpose whatsoever, and since nobody knew any more about the hand than we did before we took the cards out of the board, I decided that we needed to hurry things along. I doubled the artificial 2♦ and waited for further developments. There weren't any.

Opener, clearly terrified by my double, redoubled for rescue and the kicker forgot what to do and passed. Kicker then asked my partner about my double. "Lead directing". He looked at me with a big Cheshire cat smile and said, "Well at least you've told yourself what to lead."

I mumbled something about 5 heing a penalty card but kicker seemed unperturbed. Moments later I had two face-down cards in portrait mode and 11 in landscape.

The full hand




I put my hand up to my mouth so kicker couldn't hear me and whispered to my partner "Suckers! They could probably have made 3NT here!" After some complicated mathematics we got to the magic number of 1960. For the rest of the round nobody bothered to wake me at all, certainly not my partner.

'Keep Level with Neville!'

By Di Brooks

Last month we recorded 'High Card from the Short Side' along with 'Second Player plays Low' and Better to be a Major General Not a Trumped up Minor'

And now the favourite of the month,' Keep Level with Neville'.


The Defence needs to keep the length of suit with the known suit of the Declaring side. This is very important to watch the play, the discards by both partner and Declarer. How many times have you had a four card suit held by the 9 or 10. You have had to throw a useless card away and you chose to jettison from this 4 card suit. Unknown to you Declarer has AKxx, Dummy has Jxx and your partner has Qx. If you discard from this holding, Declarer will bring in 4 tricks, if Declarer cashes the A and K. The Queen falls. The Jack becomes good as does the fourth little card in Declarer's hand.

Take a look at this hand.

Declarer wins with SK and tables the DK. I took the Ace and returned another diamond. I didn't want to set up any of the side suits. Declarer squeezed

with her trumps. My Partner threw hearts with no care in the world.

I was down to KH and A98 Clubs. Declarer hadn't taken notice of the 7S lead and when all the trumps were gone, he played a spade and cashed the Ace. Trumped a spade and then played C3 and put up the King. We took the last two club tricks for -1.

Not exactly an easy play for Defence, but the discarding of useless hearts gave partner the knowledge that Declarer had one heart and one alone!!!!!!

And if you have a preference, you can Keep Even with Steven.

The Beauty of Precision

The beauty of Precision is the known range of points of Opener's hand.

Bidding:

- 1D = 11-15 No 5 card major
- 1H or 1S, 11 15 and showing a 5 card major
- 1NT Usually balanced, 13-15

The bid to watch is the opening 1C. The points can range from 16+ to whatever.

It doesn't promise clubs, neither does the negative of 1D show a holding in diamonds. As a negative, it shows less than 8 points.

The bidding was pretty straight forward. South; the Dealer opened –

SOUTH	WEST	NORTH	EAST
1C	Pass	1S (1)	Pass
2H (2)	Pass	2S (3)	Pass
3S	Pass	4C (4)	Pass
4S	Pass	6S	All Pass


- (1) = positive 8+ points, 5+spades
- (2) = own suit
- (3) = longer spades
- (4) = (CRO)

My partner, Egmont Melton, plays a whole different system of Precision, along with some fiddly bits. We get to play about once a year and Friday was my lucky day. I remembered that Egmont and John play CRO, ace ask convention. Egmont gave me two Aces the same colour. How proud was I that I had recalled the boys agreement. Later, in conversation, Egmont said 'I remembered you don't play CRO! The laugh was on me!!!!

Now comes the final analysis.

South had 18 points. I had a 13 count. It seemed enough for a small slam.

The contract made 13 tricks. It couldn't be broken. Then I looked at the results on the Website. We were the only pair that had bid a slam. So, what was the problem?



Five pairs bid 4S making 13 tricks.

Two pairs bid 3NtT; One made 12 tricks, the other 13 tricks.

One unfortunate declarer looked for slam, bailed out in 5S. During play, he discarded a loser. It was a spade. So, he lost his entry to the table and was minus 1.

Handy Hint:

- Opening hand, (Average) opposite a minimum reply = Part Score
- Opening hand, (Average) opposite an average opening hand = Game
- An Opening hand, (Strong) opposite part score = Game
- An Opening hand, (Strong) opposite an average opening hand = S. Slam

The information is all in the bidding.



Till Bridge Do Us Part

SOLUTION

Husband and wife partnerships are fraught with danger. This deal arose in the final of an Okbridge Internet World Championship, won by Romania.



At one table West opened 1 club and the Romanian North bid 2NT, showing a red two-suiter. South's 3 hearts became the contract. A trump was led and declarer made 11 tricks for +200.

At the other table, the USA North-South were a top class married couple:

WEST	NORTH	EAST	SOUTH
1NT	2H	Pass	3S
Pass	4S!	All Pass	

You can imagine South saying later, 'Darling, if I needed the support that you provided, I would have bid 4 spades myself.' North's reasonable actions would be 3NT (which makes on anything but a club lead) or 4 diamonds, which South should correct to 4 hearts.

South won the heart lead and played the diamond jack, king, ace. Declarer played two more diamonds, discarding a club. West ruffed and cashed the club ace. Declarer was one down for minus 50. 6 Imps to Romania.

Enough is enough, except when it comes to trump support and high cards in dummy. ●
