President's Report

Every 8 years Perth hosts the **Australian National Championships** (ANC) and

does so with great distinction and with great support from our local players. I am confident that this year's event is going to continue the tradition of "the best ANC in Australia." Since the ABF removed the requirement to hold the ANC in a 5 star hotel, with rapidly increasing costs, very few of the interstate venues have been able to match ours. The Ridges Esplanade Hotel, Fremantle is a splendid location which is going to be buzzing with bridge and bridge players for 2 weeks at the end of July. I know that the eastern states players love the atmosphere of both the venue and Fremantle and are looking forward to their trip west. Our Tournament Organiser, Sheenagh Young and her committee have done a superb job both in organisation and sponsorship. Many of our bridge clubs have offered support which has been warmly received - I heard last week that the Nedlands Bridge Club is closing for the 2 days of their ANC sponsored events and are organising transport for all of their members who wish to go down to Fremantle and play in either the Monday Afternoon or Thursday Morning Nedlands Pairs or, of course, both. This really is great support - see our web site for a full list of our sponsors. Check out the web site for a full list of ANC Congress events - remember the ANC is not just for interstate teams, it is a full blown super congress with Gold and Red points galore.

The ONLY thing that now needs to happen is for you, the West Australian bridge player, to get

 onto our web site and enter the events. Sheenagh is becoming a little worried about the level of entries and I know one of the reasons is because of the ANC requirement to pay your entry fee as you enter and WA players, me included, are not used to this idea. And, I guess, having to pay up front may cause people to worry about what happens if they can't play - don't worry you get a refund. So make Sheenaghs' day and jump onto the web site and enter a couple of events today. Make the 2 day Gold Point Open Butler a priority. Don't let the name put you off - it will just be a normal IMP scored round robin event where you will earn Gold points for every match you win as well as for your overall position (at least if you finish in the top half). There is also an ANC Restricted Butler for players with less than 300 master points - get your name down for that as the ABF is sponsoring 2 restricted pairs from each state to come and play. We would very much like to see a WA player win that. Come down for a game in the first week and take the opportunity to see and support your West Australian Open, Women's, Seniors' and Youth teams battling it out with their eastern states foes. Watch a few hands if you like - kibitzers are very welcome.

Good to see the Western Seniors Pairs filling fast – it will be a good warm up for the ANC \odot .


PARKING INFORMATION

"Claims and Misdemeanors"

The Laws define a claim as any statement to the effect that a player will win a certain number of the

remaining tricks. In many cases, the "statement" is simply the action of a player facing his hand – on the assumption that he has the rest – without making any verbal announcement to that effect. What sometimes follows is perhaps one of the more confusing situations when the director gets called to the table. The Laws of Bridge encourage players to make a claim for the remaining tricks when holding them all in order to speed up the game. Occasionally however, the consequence of making a claim has the opposite effect. It becomes necessary to spend quite some time in going through and explaining and analysing the claim.

This is what *should* happen when a claim is made:

- The claimer says how many of the remaining tricks he will make, together with an explanation of how this will happen.
- O An opponent may object to the claim if he believes that it is incorrect. The claimer might repeat his original statement and attempt to explain why he thinks he will make the claimed tricks. However, he may **not add** to anything he has said in the original statement.
- Once there has been a claim and an objection, the **Director has to be called** now. It is wrong to say, "play it out".

When the director comes to the table, he will ask the claimer to repeat the statement made at the time of the claim (remembering that often this is nothing at all). He will then ask the claimer why he think he will make those tricks. The opponents will now be given the opportunity to say why they don't think that the claim is correct.

The Director (and only the Director) now has the power to decide whether or not to allow the claim and how many tricks are to be given to each side. In coming to this decision, the director tries to rule as equitably as possible, but will rule against the claimer if there is any "normal" line of play which would result in an extra trick or trick(s) to the opponents.


Definitely the most common reason the director is called following a claim is that there is a trump outstanding – and sometimes more than one! The ruling will be in favour of the opponents when these three criteria are satisfied:

- 1) the claimer made no statement about the missing trump
- 2) it is at all likely that the claimer has forgotten about the missing trump (the fact that the claimer made no statement about the trump will be fairly compelling evidence that he has forgotten that there is a trump left)
- 3) a trick could be lost by any "normal" play of the opposing cards

"Normal" includes careless or inferior play, but does not include irrational play. So, for instance, if declarer claims while on lead just holding AKQ2 of trumps, he will not be forced to lose a trick to a defender with the singleton 3 remaining.


A further example may clarify how the director rules in such a case:

South is declarer in 4H. These are the remaining cards with the lead in dummy:



Declarer faces his hand and says, "I've got the rest." The opposition object because of the missing trump. The director is called. It becomes fairly clear that South has forgotten about the nine of hearts. There is a line of play whereby South could lose another trick – leading SA from dummy and discarding C10. Therefore, the director awards one trick to the defenders. The fact that there is a winning line on the hand – declarer leads a club to his 10 and then plays trumps from the top – is irrelevant.

In contrast, look at exactly the same scenario, but with the EW hands revered:



Again, South makes the same claim, again the opponents object, and again the director determines that declarer has forgotten about the H9. This time, however, there is no "normal" line of play which would allow the defence to make a trick. If South leads SA from dummy, East may ruff, but now South immediately realises his error and can overtrump. It would be irrational for him to discard or underruff when this would cause him to lose a trick. Therefore in this situation, the director would allow the claim.



What sort of bridge player are you?

Recently I participated in a risk workshop discussing the following diagram,

which highlighted where people tend to focus given our different perceptions of value and risk:



The discussion was (perhaps surprisingly!) fascinating. When considering risk, some people will use their experience, instinct, acumen, to determine whether possible scenarios may cause problems in the future, while others, more process and procedure-driven, will use charts and matrices to make their assessments. Obviously, the sweet spot is somewhere in between the two. If you use only matrices, you'll inevitably get bogged down in a multitude of possible risks without considering which ones should be prioritised from a business perspective. Use only instinct and things will inevitably be missed.

At the high end of instinct and acumen also sits the "HIPPO" effect, whereby the Highest Paid Person in the Organisation makes all the calls – a sure recipe for disaster. In fact, if you are sitting too tightly against either the vertical or horizontal axis you can't do anything intelligent at all.


Anyway, I started thinking about bridge (as you do) and realised that this risk diagram perfectly describes different types of bridge players. So, just for fun, I have modified it a little in the hope that it might encourage some of you to think about how you approach bridge and whether you can modify your habits to aim more towards the sweet spot.

If you are close to this end of the spectrum, your bidding is likely to be somewhat erratic; so that your partner will never know what you have (the upside is that your opponents won't either). You are likely to gamble wildly in the slam zone – with the occasional top reinforcing your preponderance for bidding this way.

In defending, you will most likely play what card "feels" right or, the one closest to your thumb. One advantage for you is that declarer will have no idea what is going on in the hand as you are unlikely to give count or suggest where your points are. In addition, you are more likely to play in tempo – as you are less likely to be thinking about what card you are playing – which will also make life harder for the declarer.

As declarer, you'll take finesses when they "feel" right, without considering possible distributions between the other hands. You won't take safety plays – which will be to your advantage when playing pairs.

Unlucky expert

SJ Simon wrote the book "why you lose at bridge" and his unlucky expert was a key character. In that book, the unlucky expert didn't consider who his partners were and emerged from tanks

during the bidding with creative bids that poor Ms Guggenheim didn't understand, leaving the partnership in contracts like 4D with a combined arsenal of only three trumps between them. (This actually happened to me once – my partner opened 1H, RHO overcalled 2D and I bid 4D, which I thought would be an obvious bid to my partner. Unfortunately it wasn't, and she passed – holding two diamonds opposite my singleton.)

Anyway, if you are at this end of the spectrum – and really close to the horizontal axis, you have probably memorised all the card combinations and safety plays contained in the 200-odd pages of the encyclopaedia of bridge (EOB) and can recite to two decimal places the odds of suits breaking badly.

This can help your bridge – to an extent. Safety plays are all very well, but the Rueful Rabbit will beat you every time at pairs when the safety play isn't needed.

And if you rely wholly on the mathematics of bridge, you will miss the nuances from the other players at the table (I mean the legal nuances), such as if a player has bid and his/her partner hasn't, in which hand do you think the missing Ace is more likely to be?

World champion (insert your name here)

So, we come to the place we all THINK we are playing. We'll start with how one declares when

one is in this sweet spot. Card combinations and safety plays are well known (and can mostly be played with instinct and acumen anyway), however they are used judiciously. First, the bidding is used to provide some clues as to the placement of the cards, so just because the EOB states the cards should be played x-way to produce the required number of tricks, does not mean that is the best way to play them every time. They consider the hand in a holistic context.

Second, as each card is played, the picture of what each hand looks like is modified so that by the critical point, the world champion pretty-much knows where the remaining cards are.

Third, using instinct and consideration, cards are mentally placed where they are needed to be for the contract to make and then played accordingly. I once played towards dummy's KQx in a suit and my RHO visibly hesitated before playing small, "telling" me she had the Ace. However, unless the Ace was with my LHO, I was not going to make my contract, so I returned to hand in another suit and, with great trepidation, played towards dummy again – it was my only chance, and it worked. (The hesitation by RHO should be considered unethical, however in this particular case there was a reasonable excuse.)

This leads to the final important component of declarer play – table presence and knowing your opponents. You are not allowed to take inferences from your partner when defending (unless s/he legally signals with their carding), however as declarer you can take advantage of the defenders.

Finally - the bidding. The world champion promotes accountability in the partnership through "freedom within boundaries" – bidding is not an exact science – if it was, we'd all be playing in the same contracts and bridge would be a dull game indeed. Successful partnerships are fully accountable for their own bids and can make esoteric ones with confidence as their bidding boundaries have been agreed.



Shape of 4711

Take this example:



The bidding was passed around to North, who opened 1C, East overcalled 1H. When South passed, West now responded with 1NT. N; 2C East: 2H, South raised to 3C, bidding passed around to East: 3D. All pass.

Sad to say the contract of 3D resulted in one down, whereas most people played in 3H making 10 tricks.

The consensus of opinion was that East should just bid game in hearts, because of their shape.

So remember, if you hold a 4711 and partner shows some interest, go for game. You, like the in house perfume, might come up smelling of roses.



What are your options? You could hope that someone holds precisely *QJ10, in which case the *9 will set up with a ruff. The power of prayer may help with that quest.

More likely, you could try for a squeeze, or pseudo-squeeze, by running trumps.

If you are prepared to risk instant annihilation, then your best chance is to play a low diamond from both hands at trick one. If West lacks the heart ace, he will expect that the defensive ace is in diamonds (he knows that his side has an ace from the bidding), and is very likely to continue with diamonds. Then if diamonds are 3-3

If you were West and saw your diamond queen hold the first trick, would you switch to a heart? Nor would I.

The moral: Put yourself in an opponent's shoes.



Slam hands in teams matches often provide large swings. So it proved in the semi-finals of a World Youth Teams:



With diamonds 3-2, about a 68% chance, North-South can make 7C, 7D or 7NT. No one bid the grand slam and two pairs missed the small slam:

Answer to the problem

One South bid 5D, passed out for +440, while the other South found the better action, 4H, a cue-bid in support of diamonds. North then asked with 4NT and 5NT, but could not find out enough to bid seven. Even so, bidding 6D was worth 11 Imps.

After 5NT, promising that the partnership held all the aces and the DK, DQ, South might have ventured 7D on the basis of the source of tricks in clubs. Still, the grand slam is not such a great contract. It would be superb if the partnership also had the DJ.

Bridge and skiing have something in common. Falling over isn't important. It's getting up again.


