INTRODUCTION

Bridge has been played at Herald Ave Senior Citizens Club for many years on an informal basis by a small group of members. Now in addition to the many other activities run from the Centre "Willetton Bridge Club" has been formally established. Recently the club was officially registered with BAWA (Bridge Association of WA) and ABF (Australian Bridge Federation).

BACKGROUND

Last year, a number of Members got together to establish a formal Willetton Bridge Club with the aim to play supervised bridge on a regular basis. An interim committee was established to coordinate matters. This committee reports to the Herald Ave Management Committee.

Noel Daniel, a certified Bridge instructor initially conducted a series of free lessons for interested members. These lessons, supported by loan equipment from BAWA generated enormous interest at Herald Avenue. Due to this interest and with support from Noel Daniel regular directed sessions were established on Monday afternoon in the Herald Ave dining room.

Following that success, and with support from The City of Canning and generous funding to buy equipment, a series of further lessons have been conducted in 2018. These lessons have been for beginners as well as more advanced players. All these classes received great support and generated even more interest in having regular bridge sessions.

Through the enthusiasm of members, this has now developed into a membership of over 50 people with about 30 members playing regularly on Monday and another 16 playing on Fridays.

- 1. When Dummy was tabled, Randy called the director. "3H was obviously a transfer which was not alerted." The Director instructed that play continue. Eventually Declarer lost three hearts and a club to make his contract. After play was over the Director asked Randy how he was hurt by the failure to alert. Randy said that if he had known that 3H was a transfer he would have doubled, partner would have led the JH ensuring three heart tricks and the fourth heart would have promoted the SQ for a winner, and a club trick would have set the contract. The Directors ruled 3S down one.
- 2. Paul Swanson now entered an official protest. The Directors consulted further and decided that line of defence would not set the contract as on the fourth heart Declarer could ditch a

diamond from hand and a club from Dummy, eliminating two losers. The score was changed back to three Spades making.

- 3. Randy now entered another official protest. "If the JH is led and immediately overtaken by South, then a club back, finessed by Declarer, the North wins and continues hearts, then Defence will get 3 x heart tricks, 1 x club trick, and a trump trick for one down.
- 4. Then another Director said that he could make the contract against that defence. He would win the club shift with the Ace, play two rounds of trumps and play a small club away from the Queen. South wins and is forced to lead a club which Declarer ruffs in Dummy and takes the Diamond finesse, Cashes the AD and plays another diamond, end playing South who must lead a H to the K.
- 5. Yet another Director said he could set the contract on that line of play. He would allow the JH to win, take the 2nd Heart and shift to a club. Now South cannot be end played. Declarer must lose three hearts, a club, and a diamond for one down. So the final ruling was one down.
- 6. Paul Swanson asked for the floor. He said that if he had alerted and South had doubled for a heart lead, he would have passed and let East play the hand. South now has no killing lead and the contract would be made. So, the final committee decision was 3S making.■

Pre-empting Style

From Gerry Daly

In this article I want to explore thinking around pre-empting to the 3 level on 6 card suits. Beware, there are plenty of expert players who may not support the concept.

Firstly, it's worth reviewing some basic rules of thumb from the pre-emptor's handbook. The preempt is a disruptive ploy that can damage your partnership's bidding as much as the opponents'. It is important to understand the relevance of vulnerability when deciding to pre-empt.

We can be a lot bolder when not vul vs vul. Your vulnerable opponents may be unable to penalize you for fear they are getting insufficient compensation for their contract.

Position is also important. In first seat you have 3 potential victims so you are twice as likely to inconvenience an opponent as partner.

In third position partner has already passed so the chances of causing friendly fire are greatly

reduced. Your second seat pre-empts should be much more orthodox as the chances of "getting the wrong guy" are 50:50.

Another major consideration is the form of scoring. In match points it's all about frequency of success so again you can be more aggressive and not too concerned about the occasional monster bottom. Hopefully they will be more than compensated by lots of above average boards. At imps scoring however you can't afford to go for big numbers or keep your side out of a vulnerable game by deploying a poorly timed pre-empt. The final consideration is partner's disposition on the There needs to be some mutual topic. understanding on style.

Here are two hands from the recent South Perth Congress. This example is from the open pairs final. Its nil all and you are dealer against strong opponents. Clearly, we have little future in the majors and our opposition will not have any trouble bidding to their optimum level if we give them a free run. The 3D opening ended the auction and netted 91% of the match points when neither opponent could act.

If the major cards were distributed 3-1 instead of 2-2 there would be a little more to think about. Perhaps we are making a higher scoring major contract if partner has a 5-card suit? Actually, at match points I would probably still bid 3D but at imps would pass if I had 3 spades and 1 heart. With 1 spade and 3 hearts it's still a 3D opening as opposition are likely to outbid us in spades if we let them into the auction.



The next hand comes from the Swiss pairs event which employed imps scoring. This time you are dealer at favourable vulnerability. This diamond suit could be a great trick source in 3NT or a major contract suggesting you consider a pass but being first seat favourable is enough to tip the balance for me to opening 3D. Were my majors reversed I would have passed.

You can see from the diagram that EW can score vulnerable games with 3NT, 4S or 5C but only 8 out 26 EW pairs achieved a score of 600 or better. 10 were in contracts going off for scores of 100-300 and 5-9 imps in the out column.

Not all this success can be attributed to the preempt but it will have certainly helped many of the N/S pairs who picked up imps on the board. There is of course a price to pay for pre-empting and despite the quality of the diamond suit a big penalty was available to EW. The fact that in only two cases were NS doubled and taken for -800 shows how difficult it can be to bring the serial pre-emptor to justice. Provided you and your partner have a suitable temperament you should consider broadening your pre-emptive style to make life more difficult for your opponents. ●

Both men and women looked for something of interest that was less active than participating in the sports scene.


THE BOTTOM LINE






JW bid to 6 S, a 22 hcp slam depending only on the location of the K H. This time they were out of luck and since our teammates bid just game we had a pickup. I could have mentioned that we were sitting NS but am confident that you have already worked this out. Then came board 17 – dealer N, nil vul.

Our weak 1 NT opening was doubled and we scrambled to 2S that was also doubled. Somehow, I managed to establish the clubs for a critical discard before JW found all their winners and made the contract for a handy pickup. Now for board 18, dealer E, NS vul.




JW bid to 5 D. Yes, a 21 hcp minor game that depended only on a 2 – 2 trump split, including missing the A K J of trumps. This time it was a winner, but our teammates brought back +300 so our loss was limited. Now for board 19 – dealer S, EW vul.




I overcalled west's 1 D with 4 H. It could have gone seriously wrong, but it propelled JW into 4 S, and we got our best defensive boots on to put this down 3 tricks. NS at the other table made a partscore in clubs so another few imp's in the kitty.

Board 20 was a partscore bid at both tables so little swing. Board 21 we went for 1700! Ouch! The less said the better. On board 22 we were too timid to bid game so lost out. We had 22 hcp between us – what was our problem? Board 23 was a game bid and made at both tables. On board 24, JW refused to bid game, despite a combined 22 hcp. What was wrong with them? 3 S made, but our teammates went to game so we lost out. Then came board 25, dealer N, EW vul.



David showed some enthusiasm with his hand as did JW with their hearts. We can't let the youngsters push us around and it took me several goes, but eventually I worked out I had 8 clubs so bid 6. Since hearts were led, I could afford to knock out the Q S after drawing trumps to get a diamond discard, so contract made. This was a nice pickup when our teammates parted with only 200.

The theme continued on board 26, when we went to 4 H on (dealer E, all vul)



Yes 23 hcp. Why not? You only need to find the J S to make the contract. Unfortunately something went wrong so one off, not good when - 300 came from the other table. Then on board 27 we doubled a 4S bid by JW but only managed one off – deep finesse can put it two off, but we squared the board. And to finish off, board 28 was a part score battle we lost.

After all this carnage, you might be a little surprised at the final result – it was 46-47 imp's. A losing draw! Now is the time to lament that 1700 on board 21. It would be nice to say that we can learn something from all this, but that would be stretching the truth. The one thing that can be seen is that games were bid in complete defiance of the

rules taught to beginners about how many hcp you need to bid a game.

Well, as you can surmise, the remainder of the congress was composed of the good, bad and indifferent, with the occasional ugly thrown in for light relief. Overall, it was a great experience, and

if you have never been, I would recommend it as something you can put on your bucket list.

Our team mates were Penny Styles and Sue Atwell who ably supported us and put up with our indiscretions.●

Gold Coast Congress is for Novices too!!

My wife Frances and I took Bridge lessons in early 2016 played in supervised sessions at Nedlands Bridge Club for about 18 months and during this time also ventured into open club sessions during 2017. We heard about the Gold Coast Congress from friends (both Directors) who live in Newcastle and play Gold Coast every year. They suggested we 'give it a go' despite our tiny number of MPs, as there are many opportunities for 'novice' players to play within their pay grade and have a thoroughly enjoyable time. They were absolutely right. Even the main Bobby Richman Pairs competition held over three days (5 sessions), has open, intermediate, restricted and novice sections.

We went online, entered everything we could, except the teams events, as we did not know anyone else who was going with as few MPs as us. By the time the congress started in February we had amassed a total of 6MP each, so we seriously fulfilled the criteria for novice status: less than 100MP. There are also two other sections for bridge beginners: Rookies with less than 10MP and another category that is less than 50MP. We played in them all.


The playing days are full with 24 boards per session: not too stressful. For novices, most days are two sessions. It is worth noting that Bidding Boxes are not used, and some practice with paper bidding slips is a good idea, as this is standard on the East Coast. Also, the cards are not in the usual plastic 'boards' but are contained within cardboard pockets, which take a bit of getting used to.

We had a great time. During the week we played in 11 full sessions. The event organisation was superb, the Directors were most helpful and special instruction booklets outlining expected behaviour and important bridge rules were given to all novice players. It is a bit daunting to turn up to an event with 3000 people playing bridge, most of whom are much more experienced. We found everyone to be friendly, the bridge was enjoyable, we learnt a lot and also got value from the Celebrity Bridge lessons held on most days. Playing in the <100MP events was particularly enjoyable and less challenging than our club sessions in Perth.

Despite our lack of experience, we did have an occasional 'win' and managed to add 1.8 Gold Points to our total. What more could we ask?

So, if you fancy a treat, gird your loins, book your flights and get ready for Gold in 2019. You will not be disappointed. Anyone for teams??●



Test Your Slam Play

By Bill Jacobs

SOLUTION



Line 1: Play diamonds from the top, hoping for a 3-3 break. Chance of success: 36%.

Line 2: Play *****AK, hoping for a 2-2 break. Chance of success: 41%.

Line 3: Run \blacklozenge 9 at trick 2, hoping \blacklozenge 10 is on-side, and the suit breaks no worse than 4-2. Chance of success: 42%.

The correct line? Ignore all those numbers, and start with line 2, cashing AK. Then if someone shows out on the second round, play diamonds from the top. If diamonds are 3-3, and the A is with the club shortage, then you will still make your contract. If clubs prove to be 4-0, you can revert to diamonds after the first round of clubs, avoiding the risk of a winning club being cashed. For the numerically inclined, chance of success: 52%.

The moral: Two chances are better than one.

The Passing Parade


SOLUTION

Suppose right-hand opponent opens 1NT. What would you do with:

- ♠ 87
- ♥ AKQJ63
- ♦ Q6
- ♣ 642

Since you have ready-made defence against notrumps, you should pass and defend. The same would apply if you had HK-Q-J-10-x-x and an outside ace. With an obviously good lead and an outside ace, pass and defend.

South should have heeded that advice on this deal from on BBO:

Although 2H will make, it was a bad idea since it drove East-West to 3D, which makes comfortably on the normal heart lead and can be defeated only via SA, SK, spade ruff. Bidding 2H also persuaded South to compete to 3H, which was one down for –50.

At the other table, after Pass : 1D : Pass : 1NT, South passed and 1NT became the contract. South led the HK against 1NT. The result was one down for N-S +50.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY TO BAWA COMPETITIONS
